Ignorant of this fact, nurses and mothers have applied pure glycerin to the chafed skin of infants, producing often great pain. The glycerin ought to have been first mixed with an equal bulk of water. This being done, it may be applied to the most tender surfaces without producing injury, and, as it does not dry up, it virtually maintains the part in a constantly moist condition, excluding the air and promoting the healing process.

Rosewater is most frequently used, and benzoin is an excellent addition.
