Reform in Funerals.

A federation of churches in Pittsburg and vicinity has taken up the subject of funeral reform, and makes a number of valuable recommendations to that end. Among other things the federation advises that display of all kinds should be avoided, and that floral offerings, if used at all, should be simply inexpensive. Personal references to the deceased at the funeral should be omitted. Services at the grave are declared to be unnecessary, and in no case should the persons who attend them be expected to stand with uncovered heads. The admission of curious people to view the dead before the funeral is specially deprecated. Finally a discontinuance of the custom of wearing mourning is strongly recommended as being scarcely in harmony with the hope of the Gospel. These suggested funeral reforms are clearly in the interest of good sense and refined feeling. Some of our funeral customs are relics of a superstitious and barbarous age, and are without excuse in an enlightened community. Chief among these is the senseless and extravagant outlay for flowers, coaches, funeral trappings and other things, often indulged in over people whose whole lives have been a struggle with poverty and pain. Lavish expenditure over the sepulchre of any person, rich or poor, high or low, has nothing to commend it in reason or religion. Respect for the dead does not demand these things, while a proper regard for the living calls for their abolition.—Leslie's Weekly.

Law Reform Needed.

The Toronto Globe gives the following instance of the very round about way a suitor has to take to get beaten in a law suit in Quebec. "Action was taken in the Superior Court by a poor widow against a municipal corporation, for damages for the death of her husband, caused, as she alleged, by the fault of the corporation. The Superior Court judge dismissed the action. Plaintiff appealed to the Court of Review in Montreal, and the three judges of that court unanimously reversed the judgment and condemned the defendant to pay \$3,200 and costs. The corporation then appealed to the Court of Queen's Bench, and the five judges of that court unanimously confirmed the judgment of the Court of Review. The corporation then appealed to the Supreme Court at Ottawa, and the five judges of this court unanimously reversed the judgments of the Court of Review and of the Court of Queen's Bench, and, affirming the judgment of the first judge, dismissed the action with costs against the plaintiff; so that this unfortunate woman, with eight judges in her favour, and only six against her, finally lost her case. The law's uncertainty was never better illustrated. Can somebody suggest a remedy?"

International Courtesies.

On the boundary line between Vermont and Quebec province, in Canada, is an old building, which is now used as a postoffice for both countries. It is an old stone building built about seventy-five years ago, and is located at Beebe Plain, a town that is United States on one side of the street, and Canada on the other. The postoffice is an exhibition of the goodwill of the people of the section. The father is the postmaster for Quebec, and the daughter postmistress for Vermont. The post in front of the building is the boundary line. It was moved at one time by one of the citizens to get a road into his place that would be in Canada, and cost the two Governments a great outlay to establish the exact line again. The offices were put in the same building to accommodate the farmers, who did not care to get out of their wagons at two points.

WORKING BUTTER.

Care Should be Taken Not to Overdo the Matter.

One cannot write intelligently about working butter without first taking into consideration the condition of the butter to be worked, writes F. W. Moseley in The American Cultivator. We will, however, assume that in churning the butter has been left in granules and the buttermilk properly drained and rinsed out. If sufficient time is taken, the rinsing water can be drained off so thoroughly that no working will be required until the butter has been salted and set away till the grains of salt have dissolved. Then it must be worked just enough to dispose of the resulting brine.

The hands are not to come in contact with the butter for their warmth will have a tendency to melt its grain. Therefore the person who is to do the working should be prepared with a flat ladle with which to turn the edges of the butter toward the center as the working proceeds.

The neatest job of butter working the writer ever witnessed was done by a lady. She used a common V shaped lever butter worker. She first spread a piece of musline over the bed of worker, letting the edges fall over each of its sides. Then the lot of butter to be worked, granular, of course, was poured on the musline, and the proper amount of salt was sifted or sprinkled on, I do not remember which. The working consisted of a slight downward pressure of one of the flat surfaces of the lever, with perhaps an occasional pressure of a corner of the lever for the purpose of making a channel for the escape of the brine. In this instance time could not be spared to salt the butter and set it away to allow the salt to dissolve.

Instead of using a ladle to turn the butter back to the centre of the worker the edges of the musline were lifted, first one and then the other, and drawn so as to fold the edges of the butter toward the centre. It was a very nice way of doing it; more gentle than it could have been done with a ladle. This was repeated as often as necessary, and when the mass of butter became too much elongated the same thing was done with the ends of the muslin.

Remember that in working butter with a lever the pressure should be straight down instead of a side or sliding one, for the latter will break the grain.
