#### Quarterly Meeting.

#### TOWN COUNCIL.

#### A New Fire Bell.—The Banquet Committee Called .- A Watch for Harry McLean.

At the meeting of the town council on Monday evening, all were present except Coun. R.B. Jones who is sick. The report of the town treasurer showed a debit balance at the bank on March 4th of \$5940.56.

The report of the Police Magistrate show ed that \$44 of fines were still outstanding. Coun. Dibblee thought these fines should be collected. If a fine imposed on an offender was not collected it was a strong inducement to the man to offend against the law again.

Coun. Carr thought that the way to keep order in town was to carry out the law strictly. About a week ago four men had been arrested and kept in the lock up over Sunday and he had since observed a marked improvement in the deportment of the reckless element in town.

The matter of collecting these fines was referred to the police committee.

The committee on a dwelling house for the engineer of the water works recommend ed that one be built and the report was received and recommendation was ordered to be carried out.

Howard Stevens and John McAdam were appointed surveyors of lumber wood and bark. The hour at which the night watch is to come on duty was set at 7 oclock the year round. John Ganter was reappointed Engineer of the water works and Electric light.

Coun. Lindsay reported for the special committee to look into the matter of giving a piece of land to the Government for an armory. The committee thought the town would gladly give a piece of land if they had one, but they had none. They referred the Government to the County of Carleton who had a most suitable piece of lard on Main street. The committee could not recommend the town to purchase a piece of land

The bill of Mrs G. Weeks, \$9.00 for looking after the town's gravil pit, was paid at \$6.00. The street committee was instructed to prosecute parties hauling gravel from the pit.

On account of the illness of Coun. R. B. Jones the matter of estimates for the current year were laid over till next Friday night when they will be the first in order of busi-

The matter of the taxes of Charles Atherton and George Baker who paid for 1899 though not living in town, referred to finance

the Friday night meeting.

Mr. Munro who was heard, said the old bell was of steel and not a good one. ### N. B. LEGISLATURE.

[Special to THE DISPATCH.]

House sat one hour today. The bill relating to provincial revenues was read a second time. The bill provides that within six months after close of fiscal year the Auditor General shall publish in the Royal Gazette statements of receipts and expenditures of province for the preceeding year. Such statements shall give to the public reasonably full information of the financial condition of the province.

Mr. Hazen inquiried "Does the government intend to cause thorough investigation into the facts in connection with the placing at the time of last revision of list of voters in the parish of Rothsay of over four handred persons who had no qualifications as voters in said parish and who made no application to have their names placed thereon, and whose names it was declared by a judgment of the supreme court were placed thereon by means of forgery and theft? Does the government intend to take steps to ascertain and punish the person or persons who were quilty punish the person or persons who were guilty of having such names placed upon the list by such criminal means? What proceeding does the government intend to take for this purpose and when will they be taken?"

Attorney General Pugsley replied "yes" to the first two questions and to the third he said, "By proceeding in the manner usual in cases where an offence has been committed, by seeking to discover the guilty parties and then having the necessary information laid against them. The proceedings have already been taken by the Attorney General and will be continued as long as there is a reasonable chance of ascertaining the names of the person who committed the offence."

Hon. Mr. Tweedie stated in reply to a question by Mr. Hazen that the government would introduce a bill to amend the marriage law so that Jewish Rabbis could be licensed to solemnize marriage.

Hon. Mr. Labillois said in reply to Mr. Osman, that the department of public works had not received a report upon preliminary survey for construction of a bridge across the

Petitcodiac River above Moncton. The bill for granting aid in erection of a cold storage warehouse was read the second time. The bill provided that the government will guarantee principal and interest to the extent of \$60,000 to a company to aid in the erection of cold storage warehouses in St. John and other central places in the province.

Coun. Balmain reported on the matter of Thursday next, Resolved that in opinion of this House it is desirable to the interests of public justice and morality that the Attorney General shall discharge his duty as a law officer of the crown by causing immediate steps to be taken for punishing the criminal or crimifraud, and that there are now sufficient facts publicly known to warrant the commencement of a preliminary investigation before a magistrate

Mr. Mott gave notice of inquiry, has the government yet concluded an agreement with the government of Canada respecting the control and management of the fisheries of New Brunswick, and if so what are its terms?

Hon, Mr. Labillois stated in reply to Mr. Hazen's inquiry re bridge building contracts that tenders for steel superstructure of several bridges were advertised for in the Royal Gazette and printed notices were sent to all bridge building companies in Canada and principal companies in the United States. Tenders were received from the Dominion Bridge Co., Montreal; Hamilton Bridge Co., Hamilton, Ont.; King Bridge Co., Cleveland, Ohio,; Phænix Foundry, St. John,; Berlin Iron Works, Three Rivers P. Q.; W. Brewer, St. Mary's, N. B. Prices of tenders ranged from 5.1.3 cents to 9 cents per pound for Bridges erected and completed ready for traffic, according to plans and specifications prepared by Chief Engineer Wetmore of the Public Works Department.

The Contracts were in each instance awarded to Berlin Iron Works at Three Rivers, P. Q. at the average price of 5 4-7 cents per pound.

Dr. J. W. Jackson of New York, who made some unkind statements in the Maine papers last fall about some of the guides of the Tobique hunting region and who was answered through THE DISPATCH by Mr. T.
