

MARYSVILLE WON

From the Home Team.—Wellingtons Down the Utopias.

The above are the positions occupied by the Marysville and Woodstock hockey teams when the face off occurred in the Century rink last Thursday night. "Which won?" did you say. Marysville, by a score of 5 to 2.

The visitors showed up in great form. The shooting and lifts by Robertson were much to be admired, and Black's good work was a feature of the game. The two Stephensons and Inch went far towards making a good forward team. Cain at goal and Smith at point played good defence games. The defence of the visitors was something new in Woodstock, for when the rubber got near their goal, five or six would line up in front of it, making it next to impossible to get the puck through. For our boys, the forwards and McLean played fine games. Dibblee and Williams both seemed to have an "off" night. Still, at times, they both made some good plays, Williams especially, when the rubber kept hammering at him thick and fast.

When the game commenced the puck went to the visitors' goal. Black captured it and made a good run down the ice, shooting to Williams who made a good stop. Black again made a run and succeeded in getting it past Williams after six minutes play. Seven minutes later Robertson shot a goal, and half a minute later, E. Stephenson took the spectators' breath away by putting it through. So ended the first half, after some good playing.

In the second half Robertson and Inch scored for the visitors, and Stanley Pickles twice won for our boys. In this half our forwards and point did great work. When the bell rang the score was Marysville, 5; Woodstock, 2.

B. M. Macleod was referee, Wm. Hill and Carl Nowlan, judges, and Geo. E. Balmain and Ed. Estabrooks, timers.

Arrangements were made whereby the Marysville team stayed over and another game was played Friday night. This resulted in another victory for the visitors, although many people think the score should be a tie. It was a hot game from start to finish, and if any of our townspeople think our boys cannot play hockey they—well, they should have witnessed that game. Marysville played the same as on the previous evening, but the personnel of the home team was changed. Drysdale took Dibblee's place at cover point; Connell went to his regular position of rover, and Norman Loane played center.

This probably was the roughest game ever played in Woodstock. Both sides started in to play the game, and played it. Body checking was quite prominent. Drysdale did not do as much slashing as on Thursday night. Black, for the visitors, should have been given a rest for holding Stanley Pickles. As it was he was once cautioned by the referee for off side playing. He complains that while skating up the side some spectator kicked him. If this was done intentionally, we feel assured that if the perpetrator of the deed is discovered, the manager will hereafter exclude him from the rink. But both teams put up a good game; and a gentleman from Montreal told THE DISPATCH that were our boys a trifle heavier and had they a little more combination work, they would be a hard team to beat. This is corroborated by the Marysville team.

Loane shot the first goal. E. Stephenson shot for goal which the goal judge (Wm. Hill) thought did not turn out as the Marysville boys thought it should. Result, a seven minute "kick" by the visitors. The next goal was shot by E. Stephenson, and the third by Robertson. In a scrimmage at the Nashwaak's goal, the puck went through, or partly so, but Nowlan would not allow it, although almost all present say it was a goal. So the half ended 2 to 1 in Marysville's favor.

In the second half Connell scored, making the game a tie. H. Stephenson scored for the visitors, and although our boys played well the bell sounded with the score sheet showing Marysville, 3; Woodstock, 2.

The Marysville players are a gentlemanly lot of young men, and won many friends in this, their first visit to Woodstock.

Monday night the Wellingtons and the Utopias met in a local game and the former were victorious by five games to one. The game was quite exciting at times, then again it was slow. The Utopias were handicapped by the absence of Drysdale, who for some reason or another, did not appear, and Allingham took his place in the forward line. Holyoke made a very good rover. Mair in the first game he ever played did some good work. Dibblee in a local game seems to be O. K. The Wellingtons all played their usual good game with Stanley Pickles as the shining light. Gordon Connell was referee; Wm. Hill and Ed. Estabrooks, judges; and Arthur Hay and Jack Christie, timers. The teams line up as follows:—

Utopias—Carr, goal; Mair, point; Dibblee, cover point; Holyoke, Allingham, Loane and Hull, forwards.

Wellingtons—Aughterton, goal; Long, point; Chapman, cover point; S. E. Pickles, J. Pickles, McLean and F. Dickinson, forwards.

The first half opened with Loane shooting straight for goal, but McLean nearly blocked them. Dickinson made a bad pass but further on in the game nobly redeemed himself. Chapman, Dibblee and Holyoke made some good shots, and after twelve minutes play Allingham scored the first goal. Three minutes later McLean took the rubber down the ice and tied the game. Stanley Pickles made a break in securing the puck and taking it across the ice in front of his own goal, nearly losing it. Aughterton made some good stops of Dibblee's hot ones. But after three

minutes of play Stanley Pickles scored and again, one minute before the half ended, repeated the trick. Score, Wellingtons, 3; Utopias, 1.

The second half opened with hot work and in about half a minute Stanley Pickles slipped the rubber into the required place, and shortly after McLean followed suit. Hull made some good shots in this half and Aughterton correspondingly stopped them. The game ended with the Wellingtons having five goals to their credit and the club men one.

THE four-mile race in the roller rink, Saturday night, came off as advertised. A large number was in attendance.
