What I Saw Across the Sea.

At last I saw the tower. As we had to wait one half hour before the gates would be thrown open we inspect the front as it stands on the bank of the Thames. The other three sides are surrounded by a dry moat. The tower was founded, as many of my readers know, by William the Conqueror in 1078. It covers an area of eighteen acres. The present buildings are mostly of the Norman period. In this day it is not considered a place of great military strength as in the past. It has been used for a threefold purpose, a fortress, a palace, and a prison. The inner wall is flanked by thirteen towers. We enter the south side under the Bloody Tower. As we approach the entrance we have a good view of the fortifications. The highest building is the White Tower. From one of the windows of this tower Lady Jane Grey saw her husbands headless body brought in from Tower hill. We next visit the Lion Tower. Here the visitor obtains a pass which admits him to see the regalia or crown jewels and also the armoury. We shall not attempt to describe all the various towers. We enter the bell tower that was used in the reign of King John. Here was imprisoned the Princess Elizabeth by her sister, Queen Mary. In this tower is the Council Chamber where Guy Fawkes and his fellow conspirators were tried and condemned in 1605. The Bloody Tower derives its name from the suicide in it of Henry Percy, Earl of Northumberland, in 1585. In this tower Sir Walter Raleigh was allowed to walk during his long imprisonment. In Wakefield Tower the crown jewels are kept. The visitor who has obtained a ticket passes up a short stair and finds himself in a well lighted apartment. Tradition says that Henry VI. used it for his devotions when a prisoner in the tower and was here murdered. In the center of this room in a large double case are arranged the splendid objects which form the English regalia. The most remarkable being the crown of Queen Victoria. It was constructed in 1838 for Her Majesty's coronation. The crown contains 2,700 rubys and diamonds. There are a number of other crowns, one made for the coronation of Mary the second wife of James II., the Prince of Wales coronet, St. Edward's staff, a sceptre of gold 4 feet seven inches in length, the anointing spoon, the eagle for the anointing oil, the golden salt-cellar, the baptismal font used at the christening of the sovereigns' children, the sacramental plate used at the coronation. In one of the recesses can be seen the curtain, the sword of mercy, pointless, the blade 40 inches long, and two swords of justice. These are all of gold. While looking at this valuable collection of golden vessels an American who stood behind me tapped me on the shoulder and said he would like to have them to melt up. In the cases are also exhibited the insignia of the British and Indian Orders of Knighthood, collars, stars and badges. The whole collection valued at £17,000,000 sterling. From here we visit the chapel of St. John. The chapel is the largest and most complete now remaining in any Norman castle and must have seen the devotions of William the Conqueror and his family. From this chapel we are taken to the armoury and here we are shown the helmets and coats of mail worn in the 14th and 15th centuries. Entering another large room we see a glass case containing executioners' swords, thumb screws, the scavengers daughter for confining the neck, hands and feet, biboes for ships use and thumb screws, also the collar taken from the Spanish Armada. In one corner on a platform are several old cannon including one and part of another from the wreck of the Mary Rose sunk in action with the French off Spithead in 1545. In the center of the room is the uniform worn by the Duke of Wellington in 1826. Near this is a portion of the pump of the Mary Rose. Beyond this is a glass case containing the soldiers cloak on which General Wolfe expired at Quebec in the moment of victory, 1759. At the end of the room is the block on which Lord Lovat in 1747 lost his head at one stroke of the axe for the share he took in the attempt of the pretender in 1745. The execution axe beside it was here as far back as 1687. Leaving here we enter a small chapel called St. Peter's built by Henry VIII. The space in front of the chapel is called Tower Green and was used as a burial ground. In the middle is a small square plot paved with granite showing the site on which stood at rare intervals the scaffold on which private executions took place. It has been specially paved by the orders of Her Majesty. The following persons are known to have been executed on this spot, Queen Anne Boleyn second wife of Henry VIII., 1536. Margaret, Countess of Salisbury, the last of the Plantagenet family, 1536. Queen Catharine Howard fifth wife of Henry VIII., 1542. Jane Viscountess Rochford, 1542. Lady Jane Grey, 1544. Robert Devereux, Earl of Essex, 1601. In another part of the tower may be seen various types of weapons used in the old days such as cross bows, daggers, swords, pikes, lances 16 feet in length, battle axes and other relics suggestive of war. Having seen a large portion of the tower we return to our hotel. As we cannot

think of leaving England without a visit to Windsor castle and to accomplish a double purpose we go up the River Thames by steamer and return by rail. We purchase tickets for Hampton Court and go on board the steamer at Charing Cross pier. The distance from London to the court is twenty-three miles. The day was fine and a large number of passengers were enjoying the trip. Many interesting things are to be seen as we glide along the smooth waters of the Thames.

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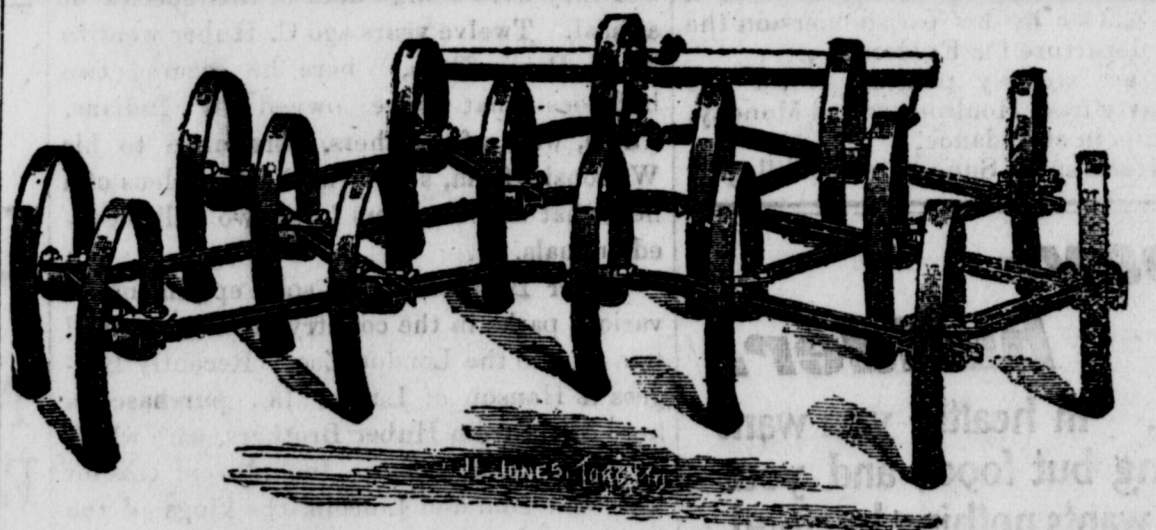
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
