Our Game Preserves.

Mr. Adney, a gentleman well known in the hunting districts of New Brunswick, writes the following letter to the editor. Mr. Adney knows what he is talking about and his letter is well worthy of consideration. Mr. Adney says-"I see in March 27 issue of THE DES-PATCH editorial comment about New Brunswick at the Chicago Sportsmen's Show. We missed that part of the Sportsmen's Show in New York this year, but I have wondered whether really many sportsmen are brought to make the trip into the New Brunwick forests or the Adirondacks, or Maine, as the case may be) by such manner of advertisement or whether more are not drawn into such new fields by the influence and example of their friends. Many gentlemen rather avoid a place when it becomes extensively advertis ed in a public manner, for they know that the rarest features of a region are destroyed as soon as the crowd begins to go that way. As an instance in point, several years ago I was asked by the chief taxidermist of the American Museum of Natural History of this city where the best place was to obtain materials for the construction of a large lifesized group of Moose then in course of construction by the Museum. I told him, "Tobique." Now as anyone may know, Moose are found in comparative plenty all the way from New Brunswick to Alaska. The gentleman, however, took my advice, went to New Brunswick, secured the "accessories" for that magnificent group, and was further successful in securing a bull moose, with sixty inches spread of horns, an animal that had been on the "waiting-list" of the Mueum for several years. He was with the party several years ago that first safely traversed the Grand Canyon of the Colorado. and he accompanied Lieut Peary on his first trip into the far Arctic, wintering with him in Greenland. Both are now the busiest of busy men in their several occupations, and a rough trip into a wild country is a most grateful change. It is this class that more and more are spending vaca-tions in what Mr. Ireland has rightly called the only "untouched" wilderness in the East, and (I might add.) south of the far northern portions of Ontario, Quebec and Labrador. Chinese Affairs.

PEKIN, April 15.-Li Hung Chang has applied to General Chaffee to leave behind, when he departs, Captain Lillson and a sufficient number of men to police the Chinese city, as the Chinese fear the district will not be well looked after when controlled by other foreigners.

An expedition consisting of 5,000 German and 3,000 troops will leave Pao Ting Fu tomorrow to drive from the province several thousand Chinese who refuse to obey the order of Li Hung Chang to keep the boundaries already arranged.
