Mr. Knox has for some years been superintendent of the woolen mills at Woodstock and thoroughly understands the work. It is expected that he will have the new mill in full operation about the first of June.—Gleaner.

THE Lady Minstrels from Houlton gave a performance to a crowded house in the opera house last Friday evening. The music was good and sometimes better. The local hits, which were never severe, were highly entertaining. After seeing the show the religious editor says he is in favor of the abolition of the colour line. The young lady who sang "Lady Africa" made a hit, she had a walk over.

At the annual meeting of the Tobique Log Driving Company at Andover, Geo. A. Murchie, James McNair, F. H. Hale, R. A. Estey and Henry Hilyard were chosen directors, and Mr. Hilyard president. The corporation drive was sold to the lowest bidder, Mr. E. McCallom, at the rate of 17½ cents from the Forks of the Tobique to the St. John. The quantity of logs to be driven out this year is fifteen millions, compared with twenty millions last year.

At the Supreme Court in Fredericton last week, the case of Charles L. Noddin against John Scott, Moody Scott and Ambrose Scott was argued. This was an action of trespass and assault tried at the Carleton Circuit in October last, and resulted in a verdict for the plaintiff Noddin, for the sum of \$354. The defendants moved for a new trial, or reduction of damages, on the ground that the judge had misdirected the jury, and also that the damages were excessive. The court unanimously upheld the verdict, and the defendants' application was refused. C. N. Skinner K. C. and Wendell P. Jones for the plaintiff, L. A. Curry K. C. and Frank B. Carvell for the defendants.

THE Assessors met the finance committee last Friday evening and together they put four hours hard work on the assessment. They struck 164 names off the list. Some of the men were dead, some have moved away and others were on twice. Fully one hundred of these names, which were on the last assessment, should have been taken off when it was being made up a year ago. That they were left on was not entirely the fault of the Assessors, for the council urged that they be retained on the assessment to swell the assets of the town. Some radical changes will be made in this year's assessment, by changing the valuation of many pieces of property and by other means.

COAL VS. WOOD.—The people of Houlton, Caribou and Presque Isle have decided to very largely adopt coal as a fuel in place of wood. In 1899 the people of Houlton used only 2000 tons of coal, last year they used twice as much, 4000 tons, and this year their consumption of coal will be over 5000 tons. The C. P. R. is reducing the rate on coal from St. Andrews gradually, as the consumption increases. The dealers get hard coal at New York, have it brought to St. Andrews in schooners and get it into Houlton, Caribou and Presque Isle via the C. P. R. They build coal sheds along the railway track and so handle it very cheaply. Last year the retail price of coal per ton in Houlton was only \$6 50.
