Cost of Producing Milk.

The great difference in cost of milk when made by good cows and by poor ones is shown by the experiments of the practical dairy operated at the New Jersey Experiment Station. The value of the yearly product of their best cow at 3 cents per quart is \$114.26, and of the poorest cow \$60.74, while the average product is worth \$86.89. The cost of feed for the cows is estimated at practically \$71.92; while for the poorest cow they are \$18.40.—American Agriculturist.
