Prof. Goldwin Smith on the Influence of

the Queen.

Respect for the memory of the Queen is running, as sentiment in these sensational days is apt to run, into an extravagance which kills genuine praise. She is said to have effected a marked change for the better in the character of British society. Whatever influence she did exercise was social; and as her own personal and domestic conduct was spotless, that influence was entirely for good. But it is slavish to suggest that British society owes its improvement and purity to a court. No marked change in that respect dates from the Queen's accession. A gradual improvement had been going on for some time, traceable, if to any persons in particular, to Wesley and the Evangelicals, Wilberforce and his sect; but really to influences of a very general kind. The trials through which the nation had gone in its struggles with Napoleon and the great Reform movement which ensued, by the serious turn which they gave to national feeling, probably did their part. The lives of Pitt, Canning, and the public men who followed presented on the whole a happy contrast to the lives of public men in the preceding era. George IV. was a legacy of the eighteenth century. It so happened that Lord Melbourne, the young Queen's special favorite and the head of her court as well as her Council, was, in his moral tone at least, rather conspicuously unimproved. To the memory of the Queen, for the example of her personal purity, let us pay the honor due; but the foundations of British character, whether political or domestic, are laid too broad and deep to be seriously affected by any change of wearers of the Crown.

Justice Harlan of the United States Supreme Court and an Episcopal clergyman of the national capital were playing a game of golf a few days ago at Chevy Chase, when Justice Harlan, after a particularly long drive, turned to his clerical opponent and told him to better that if he could. The churchman teed up his ball with care, swung his club two or three times to limber up for a big drive, and then swung at the ball with all his might. The head of the club fannea the air, leaving the ball tantalizingly on the tee. Without a word, but with a face full of expression, the disgruntled clergyman look. ed at his legal opponent for fully a minute and then swung again. "Well," said Justice Harlan, "that was the most profese silence I ever heard."
