What I Saw Across the Sea.

In my last correspondence I began an account of the Barnardo Home in London. Dr. Barnardo, in 1865, then a young man engaged as a physician with a lucrative practice one night on his way home found a number of homeless boys on the street and invited them to his home. This was the first step toward founding the home. In 1866 the home was opened and today it is the largest of its kind on the globe. It comprises eighty-four separate homes and twenty-four mission branches and accommodation for five thousand children. Their object is to rescue them from the streets and to educate them and to prepare them for usefulness as citizens. Since the establishment of the home by Dr. Barnardo thirty thousand boys and girls have been so trained and started in life. Many of them have been sent to Canada where there are two large distributing homes and a valuable industrial farm of ten thousand acres in active operation. One of the managers told me the institution had sent eleven thousand boys to Canada and he had visited many of them personally who had made fine homes for themselves. No destitute child whatever his or her creed, age or sex, national or physical condition, is ever refused admission. At the Stepney Home which I visited about four hundred boys between thirteen and sixteen years are being trained in one or the other of the thirteen handicrafts in operation there. We were shown through the different departments. They have a small chapel where service is held every Sabbath and a Sabbath school is running, also large rooms for day school. The boys are all taught the art of cooking as the establishment is carried on in the line of cooking and washing all by the boys in turn. I was in to the cook rooms and saw them mixing their bread and carrying on other kinds of work. The grounds are enclosed by a high stone wall and the boys have no call outside. It has a gymnasium and yards where all kinds of games are played and a swimming bath in addition to the rest. The boys are dressed alike with something like a military suit. I noticed on board the Allen line steamers cabins fitted up especially for the Barnardo boys. Having leisure time one afternoon I took a stroll down Whitechapel street to see what was going on. This is the street where Jack the Ripper got in his deadly work a few years ago. I was told to be careful or I would not get back with all my clothes on. The sight beggars description, filth and squalor, children with barely enough to cover their nakedness. My visit was short. During my stay in London I had various opportunities to learn what it meant to keep order. My hotel was situated on one of the thoroughfares of the city. I was suddenly awakened one night or rather towards morning by an outcry from what seemed to be a woman's voice. I ran to the window of my room and saw a policeman trying to run down a woman. Two of them had locked hands and made off. After several attempts he succeeded in separating them and the race began single. Finally after a time he caught one and ran her in to the station. All the time she kept shouting the most bitter oaths. In the meantime I saw the other crouched up in a corner. Soon the policeman returned and had her soon out of sight. The noise and confusion of these great cities never ceases day or night and persons from the theatres and club men can be seen all hours of the night hurrying toward home. The pick-pocket is found here as elsewhere and notices are pasted up in the trains, street cars, omnibusses and public buildings. One has to look sharp after his money as they ply their trade in daylight as well as in the night. I was somewhat surprised in London as in other places at the limited knowledge that many possess of the colonies. I conversed with quite a number of well bred men who knew the history of the Empire and were up to date as far as the last play was concerned or the last novel or any act of parliament but seemed to know little of Canada. The South African war taught them more than anything else could have done of the resources of Canada. Our second Sabbath in London we decide to attend Dr. Parker's church the City Temple. Arriving a little late we found the auditorium and the three galleries full. As we entered the temple with quite a large party of Americans seats are made for us in the aisles. The temple seats about five thousand and has a choir of seventy. Amongst the musical instruments that play with the organ are eight violins and four cornets. Needless to say the music rendered was fine. Dr. Parker delivered as usual a very interesting discourse. Monday morning having come we start out to see the Tower of London and as we were a little early to gain admittance we had to wait one half hour.

What Popular Lecturers Earn.

When a well-known traveller returns to civilization after exploring some unknown country the public know that they will have an opportunity of seeing and hearing a detailed account of his remarkable trip from his own lips, for before very long he is invariably announced to deliver a lecture at some public building. Few persons have any idea how these lectures are arranged, and still less what the lecturer receives for his orations.

Of recent famous lecturers Nansen and Stanley probably attracted the greatest crowds. Indeed, it is difficult to guess what these men received in fees for their lectures. Stanley is said to have received £500 for his two hours' discourse at the Albert Hall, describing his last and triumphant journey through Central Africa.

Although actual figures are not forthcoming as to the amount he received in this country for the lectures he delivered, his American agent, Major Pond, has stated that the gross receipts for his first lecture in New York, in 1890, amounted to £3,750. Altogether, the great explorer delivered 110 lectures in America, often receiving as much as £300 per lecture. Nansen was even more successful than Stanley as a lecturer, and undoubtedly realized a snug little fortune for the hundreds of lectures he delivered in various countries.

There are scores of men in this country who could not be induced to go on the platform and deliver an address under £100. The leading men of science and the great divines could easily obtain such a figure.

When Dr. John Watson (Ian MacLaren) was last in America he received an offer of £4,800 for twelve lectures. He refused the offer as it would have necessitated his staying twelve weeks longer in the New World, and he could not afford the time. When in the United States in 1896 Dr. Watson addressed ninety-six audiences in seventy-seven days. His lecture agent cleared £7,000. When Dr. Talmage visited this country in 1879 he delivered no fewer than seventy addresses, for which he was paid £3,500.

Dean Farrar has often received £200 for a single address. Many of the great lecturers have cleared £2,000 and even as much as £2,000 in a single season by lecturing. The lectures are arranged by agents, who generally make arrangements with their clients to deliver so many addresses at a stated sum per address.

The leading men of the day who lecture on their pet subject at various public buildings throughout the country every winter receive from £10 to £25 and even £50 per lecture. It must be remembered, however, that it is very fatiguing and decidedly hard work. Indeed, it is said of one well-known lecturer that when he returns to his hotel after delivering his address his valet rubs him down, as racehorses are groomed at the end of a race.

Again, the giants of the lecture platform are men who have either risked their lives in exploring unknown parts of the world or have given years of thought and study to one particular study.—London Tit-Bits.

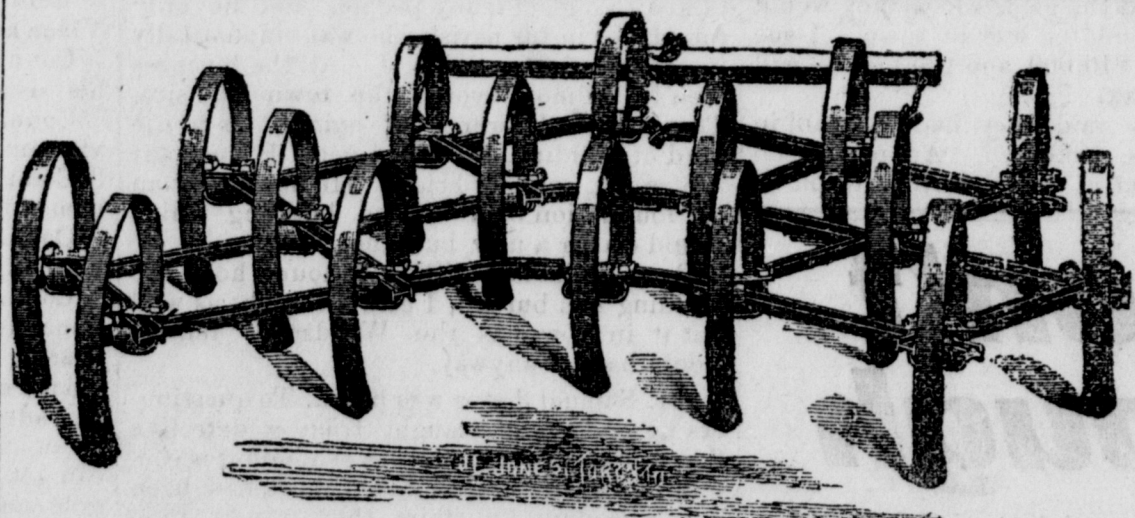
