The Anti-Cigarette Crusade.

Next to primary election bills and tax bills. measures directed against the sale of cigaretter have occupied the most prominent place before the Legislatures that have been in session this winter. Last week the House of Representatives in New Hampshire passed one of these measures, providing that hereafter no person, firm, or incorporation shall make, sell, or keep for sale "any form of cigarette." The gift of a cigarette to minors is made a misdemeanor quite as much as the sale to adults. Persons violating the law may be punished by a fine of ten dollars for the first offence, and fifty dollars for any subsequent offense. This act, which seems almost certain to pass the Senate and receive the Governor's approval, is a sample of those We can do anything that which have been presented to most of the Legislatures which have been in session. The Chicago "Tribune," which recently investigated the subject very thoroughly, reports that only two States, Wyoming and Louisiana, have not given some attention to cigarette-smoking, and that eleven States have already passed laws against it. In some cases, it says, as, for example, Rhode Island and Ohio, the law when first passed was allowed to remain inoperative, but now public sentiment seems to demand enforcement. The bills in question seem to have secured the support, not only of a great many legislators who are inveterate smokers, but also of a great many who are generally opposed to prohibitory legislation. They put the prohibition of the sale of cigarettes on a par with the prohibition of the sale of liquor to minors, inasmuch as cigarette-smoking is in a peculiar degree the practice of boys and young men. It is also urged that cigarette. smoking is more hurtful than cigar-smoking, because cigarette-smokers so often inhale the smoke into the lungs. The physical and even the mental wreck of many boys is alleged to have been the result. The anticigarette bills seem to have received the general support of school-teachers. Such measures of prohibition aimed at the protection of the individual from his own folly or wrong-doing appear to us justifiable only in so far as they protect children who are insufficiently protected by parental control. The political right to prohibit adults from injuring themselves by excessive smoking appears to us more than doubtful .- The Out-


