### Old English Law.

It is, perhaps, not generally known outside the lawyers that a great deal of English statute law is now and always has been in force in the Province of Ontario. A consolidation and revision of this law, completed under the direction of the Attorney-General and a committee of judges, is about to be passed by the legislature. The object is to make the law readily accessible to judges and lawyers, and to clear away doubts and difficulties, which have always existed. After the conquest of the French in Canada the French civil code came into force in the new possessions by virtue of the Quebec Act of 1774. Later, in 1792, Upper Canada was set apart by the British Parliament as a separate province, and the first Act of the first legislature of the new province was to declare the laws of England as they were on the 15th October, 1792, thenceforth in force here. We, thereby, adopted not only the statute law, but also the case law of England. In time it became clear that some of the statute law of England could not be made to apply in Canada, and there was a good deal of anxiety. The judges solved the difficulty by declaring that only such English Acts had come into force as were suitable to the conditions of the new land. What laws were suitable, they decided thereafter from time to time, as occasion arose. Judicial sifting, dealing as it always did with single cases, could hardly be sweeping or comprehensive, and there was always doubt. Now, after one hundred and ten years, the legislature, for the first time, takes the whole matter in hand. Some of the statutes declared to be still in force are of great antiquity. There is one of A. D. 1235, and another of 1264, enacted in the 25th year of the reign of Edward the First. There are statutes of Henry Seventh, Henry Eighth, Elizabeth, the Stuarts, and their successors. Few realize how closely these old laws are woven into our daily life. The farmer, who asks earnest from a drover buying his cattle for future delivery, seeks the protection of a statute of Charles Second. Suits are daily brought against fraudulent debtors under a statute of Elizabeth. From the effective words of a deed of land today a lawyer might unravel the whole feudal system, and much of the social and political history of the remote past. He might justly say that, although the lord or landowner is no longer entitled to feudal privileges, like giving his tenant's daughter in marriage, the feudal system, shorn by a long popular struggle of many oppressive incidents, still lives in Ontario. Many of these old statutes, especially those dealing with land holding, are the landmarks of that struggle. A lawyer might assert, not in mere playfulness, that the noisy Imperialism of the day is only a revival of habits of thought and action formed centuries ago, when men paid rent in military service and rallied as they were bid to harry and kill their neighbors in another hamlet or shire.

In 1792 Ontario was owned by a few. Had the Governor of that day been a Napoleon or a Justinian, he might easily have given Ontario a code. Had he been far-seeing, many angry questions might have been kept out of Canadian politics.—Toronto Weekly Sun.

### The Progress of Canada.

London Saturday Review.

It is a favorite habit of the superior American to treat Canadian progress with mild contempt. For some reason Canadian population has never increased in the ratio which is to be desired in any new country. But the advertisement given to the Dominion by the Prince of Wales' repeated reference to the illimitable resources yet to be tapped will no doubt have some effect, and the rapid extension of the railways will encourage settlement. The rate at which population increases,

however, is no measure of Canada's general advance, and even the superior American will admit that the latest trade returns of the Dominion are remarkable. In ten years Canada has doubled her exports and nearly doubled her imports. To what extent the business of the past year has been affected by the preferential arrangement with the Mother Country remains to be seen when the full figures are published. The main point at the moment is that Canada has had a record year, and unless all information as to trade movements forthcoming recently is unreliable, there has been considerable improvement in the business with Great Britain. That improvement would have been much greater if the preferential arrangement had been reciprocal, and not as one-sided as everything affected by our so-called free trade system is.

When our philo-American is really logical, he will admit that the realization of his favorite theories involves inevitably the transfer of Canada to her immense neighbor. This, though he often styles himself an imperialist, he declares to be inevitable, and when he carries his views to extremes he has been known to advocate the absorption of our own country by the United States as likely "to prove the end of all our troubles." So, indeed, it would be, as death puts an end to the woes of life. We have ourselves heard this policy seriously propounded by one of the most distinguished of living Nonconformists. We do not refer to Mr. Stead, who has also been ventilating these views which are indeed the reductio ad absurdum of our present policy of universal surrender to the United States. We notice with pleasure a contradiction of the ominous announcement that Lord Pauncefoot wishes to "square up" all differences with the United States before he leaves Washington, which would mean, as was hinted, that Canada cannot expect our firm support on the Alaska question. That the present government should be really contemplating an abandonment of Canada after all the sacrifices made by the latter for the empire is not perhaps inconsistent with certain spots on their record, but it would clearly be inconsistent with any claim on their part to direct any longer the affairs of a great empire.

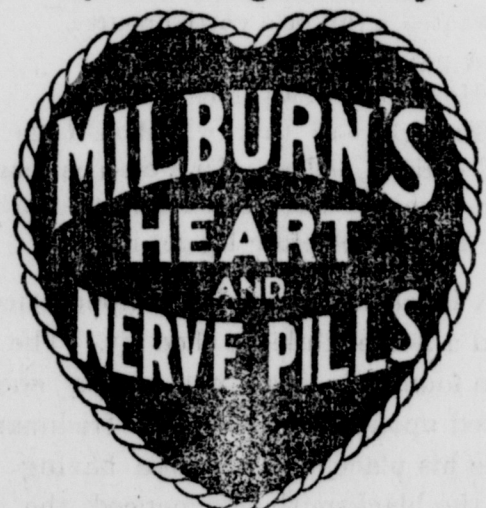
