At the last meeting of the Provisional Directors the Carleton County Hospital was decided upon as the name of the new institution. The following circular letter was sent out to all the clergymen of the county asking them to take up a collection on the 27th inst:—

DEAR SIR,—As you may have seen, no doubt, by the Woodstock papers, it has been proposed to establish a Hospital in town for the County of Carleton. The proposition has everywhere met with a most cordial approval, as the following subscriptions testify:

In order to insure permanency for the Hospital, \$1200.00 are still required; and, as no opportunity to contribute to this fund has yet been given to the people in Carleton County, it has been decided to do so now through their individual churches.

Accordingly a Hospital Sunday has been appointed for April 27th, when every church in this County is asked to take up a collection on behalf of this project.

If the Hospital seems deserving of your sympathy, as we feel sure it must, we request you adopt the same means which were employed by the ministers in Woodstock. Please have these cards distributed in the seats on the 20th inst., and collected with the offering on the following Sunday. If you will report the amount of your pledges at once, the same shall be published in local papers. As soon as possible, not later than June 1st, collections should be forwarded to Dr. T. F. Sprague, Woodstock, N. B., who will acknowledge the same with receipt.
