### Improvements in Road-Making.

Some astonishing facts have been developed by the office of Road Inquiry of the Department of Agricultural. Who would have supposed, for instance, that bad roads are so costly in comparison with good ones as to increase the expense of moving farm products and supplies threefold? Yet such is the truth, and it is estimated that the money thus thrown away more than equals, in the aggregate, the entire expenses of the United States government! On the average American road it cost twenty-five cents per ton to move produce one mile; on good roads the cost is only eight cents.

The Road Office finds the macadam road superior to all others. Powerful machinery for road building has recently been devised, such as an elevating grader, capable of lifting earth from cuts and dropping it into waggons with great rapidity.

A very interesting style of road now used in several western and middle states possesses a double steel track, laid in a concrete bed, each rail being eight inches wide, with a flange on the inner side, the space between the rail being such as to suit all standard-gauge vehicles. On these roads loads are drawn with surprising ease and swiftness. One instance is recorded in which a single horse drew a load of eleven tons, which could only be moved on an ordinary road by twenty horses. The steel-track roads vary in cost from fifteen hundred dollars to thirty-five hundred dollars per mile.

### The End at Hand.

That life is cheap and civilization only a veneer, beneath which lurk the instincts of savagery, has been made manifest by the long and sanguinary struggles in both South Africa and the Philippine Islands. Once the lust of blood is aroused as it has been in those unfortunate countries, it is hard to induce men to lay down their arms or forego the savage freedom of war. Peace, however, is evidently nearer at hand in South Africa than in the Philippines, and while it is to be hoped Uncle Sam may find some way of putting a stop to the barbarous warfare that has cost so much life and property, the situation will not be without a grim humor if he is compelled to go on struggling awkwardly with a primitive foe after John Bull shall have concluded the great white man's war he has had on his hands for a much shorter period of time. Our neighbors have so long had the laugh on "the old man" that they will not look very comfortable if the tables are turned and the laugh is on them.

In the Philippines the trial by court-martial of General Smith for cruelty and murder, in issuing orders to kill all males above ten years of age in Samar and to ravage the island has come to a close. The defence of General Smith on trial was that of justification and necessity, and it is already quite evident that even the sanest and most high-minded journals in the United States are prepared to stand behind the army in anything they may have done in dealing with the poor Filipinos. For example, "Harper's Weekly," in writing of the "water cure" and the Smith orders, argues: "A choice of cruelties is the best that has been offered in the Philippines. It is not so certain that we at home can afford to shudder at the water cure unless we disown the whole job, and if we do disown the whole job we cannot put the responsibility for it on the army. The army has obeyed orders. It was sent to the Philippines to subdue the Filipinos, and it seems to have made remarkable progress. Having the devil to fight, it has sometimes used fire; having liars to fight, it has sometimes used lies; having semi-civilized men to fight, it has in some instances used semi-civilized methods. That was inevitable and will be inevitable as long as soldiers are men. If these water cure cases are brought to trial they should be tried in the Philippines before men who are familiar with the circumstances of their occurrence and the general conditions and standards of conduct that obtained where they happened."

The United States press has been very ready and very eager to condemn the military administration in South Africa on unproven charges brought forward by Britain's enemies. It is not so ready to censure United States soldiery for offences coolly admitted and brazenly justified.—Toronto Saturday night.

### The Great Trading Nations.

(New York World).

Two nations, as showing by the latest official figures, have exports exceeding a hundred million dollars a month each. The United States is first, leading Great Britain by but four per cent.

Two nations have monthly imports exceeding one hundred millions. Great Britain and Germany. The former is far in the lead. Her imports of \$212,000,000 a month alone exceed the total foreign trade of either the United States or Germany for the same period.

Five nations have combined imports of one hundred millions per month. France is the fourth. The fifth is not India, with its teeming peoples, nor Russia, whose "benevolent assimilation" of alien races has been of most rapid, but industrious, highly educated little Holland.

Of the five great trading nations only two have considerable colonies, only two are territorially extensive. In all the average of education is higher than elsewhere. Trade may sometimes "know the flag," it always regards the school.

### Better Service and Better Pay.

The selection of the right teacher for each school is no easy matter. It imposes upon school boards a question of great weight. Many things should be taken into consideration. Everyone who holds a certificate cannot make a success in the schoolroom and before a teacher is employed, searching inquiry should be made as to his past success in the schools in which he has taught. We have sympathy for the teacher with meagre compensation, insufficient perhaps, to warrant the expense that is necessary to fit and keep himself fitted to teach, but we have much more sympathy for the pupils who are compelled to attend school where the teacher is not prepared. An untrained teacher is like an unskilled workman who attempts to man, age an engine, build a bridge, make a watch, or paint a picture.

Teachers should first of all understand that it will always be to their advantage in dollars and cents to do their best work no matter what their present salary may be. It is only as the value of the service rendered is increased that a just demand for higher salary may be made in any line of employment. Teachers who do their work conscientiously and efficiently may confidently believe that the future contains some proper recognition of their worth.—Supt. J. K. Lowry, Wisconsin.

### Progress of an Andover Man.

Mr. H. C. Henderson, late of the Fredericton High School, has been teaching psychology and pedagogy in the State Normal School at Milwaukee, Wisconsin, during the winter. This is a large and well-equipped school with a faculty of twenty teachers and an enrolment of about 450 students. It is but one of seven normal schools in that state. The course is two years. Nearly all the students are graduates of a four years' high school course, and very few are under twenty years of age. All students in the senior year are required one period a day for forty weeks either in the practice, or model school, or in the city schools. The supervision of this work employs nearly the whole time of two men. Mr. Henderson returns in June to the Chicago University to resume his studies for the degree of Ph. D.—Educational Review. [Mr. Henderson is son of the Rev. Charles Henderson, of Andover, Victoria County.]

Teachers and school officers are victimized every year by agents for charts, atlases, books of universal knowledge, and all sorts of trashy productions, often accompanied by glittering schemes for easy and cheap purchase of their requirements a long distance from home.
