EXPANSION IN U. S. HORSE TRADE. From 3,500 to 82,250 in Eleven Years—Classes of Horses in Demand.

Few more striking developments have taken place in connection with trade than in the export horse trade of the United States. The horse exports of the United States in 1890 numbered 3,500 head. Last year they numbered 82,250. Of course, a very large portion of this increase, is due to the sudden demand for American horses for military service in South Africa. A large part of the increase, however, is due to the ordinary expansion of trade. For instance, in 1898, before the South African war was thought of, American horses were exported to the number of 51,150 head. The growth of the ordinary export horse trade of the United States is attributed to the advertisement given to the American horse at the time of the World's Fair at Chicago. This made the merits of that horse known to European buyers, more particularly to British buyers, and the result is seen in the steady expansion of American horse exports to Great Britain since.

A bulletin issued by Geo. M. Rommel, expert in animal husbandry for the United States Bureau of Animal Husbandry, contains a lot of valuable information relative to the sort of horse in demand in Europe. Matured and well-broken horses are, says this bulletin, always the best sellers, and the ideal age is five years, the range usually being from five to eight. Almost any color will sell except white, flea-bitten grey, "mealy bay, or any color that may be termed washed out. The animal must be in good condition, particularly if he is a draft animal.

Speaking of the different classes of horses, the Bulletin says that the draft horse should be one running about 1,600 pounds, in fair flesh, and standing 15.3 for the smaller sorts, and 17.2 for horses of greater weights. The omnibus horse, which is largely used in London, is an animal standing 15.1 to 15.3, weighing 1,200 to 1,400 pounds, one compact in form, with all the characteristics of the true draft type, set on short, strong legs, with ample bone, more or less feather, and sound feet.

The express horse stands 15.2 to 16, weighs 1,250 to 1,500 pounds, is a rather up-standing horse, with strong, closely coupled body, considerable width of chest and hips, sound, clean limbs, and particularly good feet.

The Preacher-Premier. The following sketch of Dr. Kuyper, Holland's preacher-premier, is interesting. It is a very singular turn of affairs by which the first bona-fide Premier of Holland is found in the foremost evangelical preacher and theologian of the realm. Heretofore the cabinet has not accepted any one member as its chief; but all precedents have been set aside in the case of Dr. A. Kuyper. Dr. Kuyper is now sixty-four years of age, having led a strenuous life from his youth if any body living has. He is the leader of the evangelical church party in Holland, having established a free university whose professors are appointed by the church, not by the state. He has built up the most widely circulated newspaper published in the Dutch language; established a great church at the capital; held a professorship; edited a cyclopaedia; given to the world more than one hundred publications—the last being a monumental work upon The Holy Spirit—written an opera, and visited America as a popular lecturer. In his own home he maintains the family altar which was erected in his younger days. In his public life he seeks the things that make for peace.

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How He Asked For a Wife. (New York Tribune.) A story is told in faculty circles at Yale which goes back to 1891 for its time getting, and concerns itself with President Hadley's manner of asking the late Governor Luzon B. Morris, of Connecticut, for the hand of his daughter in marriage. Professor Hadley made the call which was to determine his future just at the time when the re-election of Governor Morris was in grave doubt, and the courts were debating the matter and the Legislature refusing to ratify it. "What can I do for you, Arthur?" said the older man, kindly, suspecting that the daughter was the reason of the visit. "I have come to you," said Professor Hadley, making his famous forearm gesture, "to know definitely whether or not I may call you Governor."
