The Legislature.

In the legislature last week, Hon. Mr. Farris introduced the bill to provide for the importation of horses. To Mr. Hazen he said the purchase would include thoroughbred, coach and heavy draft horses, all of which would be bought in Canada and the United States. It was the intention to add a section authorizing a grant of \$800 in aid of the Maritime Stock Show at Amherst and of \$500 towards assisting in the establishment of a plant for dredging mussel mud. On his recommendation, therefore, progress was reported with leave to sit again.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie replying to a question asked by the leader of the opposition as to the number of new dairy factories established, said that since the close of the last fiscal year up to the present two had been bonused in Kings county and one in Madawaska. Dairy superintendents are now making arrangements for the establishment of others. It is difficult to estimate how many new ones will apply for a bonus but it is probable that there will be the same number built this year as last.

The Premier announced that one half of the expenses incurred by municipalities on account of smallpox would be paid by the Government.

In the House on Monday Mr. Porter rose to a question of privilege. In the Sun reference was made to a payment of \$350 to Guy G. Porter, whose receipt for \$337.50, the Sun says, was produced and asks where did the \$12.50 go. Mr. Porter explained that a check for \$350 was sent to his son Guy G. Porter, in part payment of a road machine, the total cost of which was \$675. Half of this amount was paid last year and the balance will be paid out of this year's bye road grant. 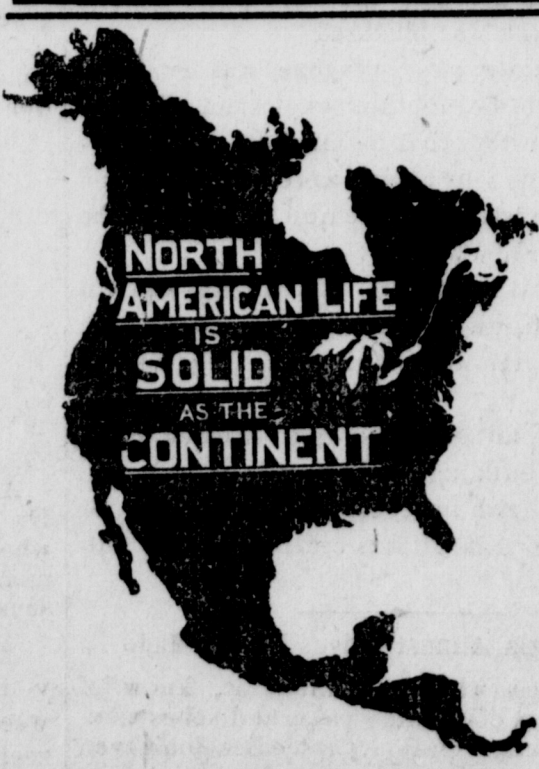
