

A dispatch from London says:-In th course of a few days the year's mourning o the royal family for the late Queen will be over, and the Court will resume a brighter aspect. The West End is full of preparations for the new order of things, and 'it is clear, from many indications, that their Majesties desire the London season to be as cheerful as conditions will permit. Many families are in mourning because of losses in South Africa, and, for various reasons, it is presumed Queen Alexandra, Princess Christian and Princess Henry of Battenburg will continue their predilection for the more neutral tones in ordinary wear. But the aspect of society will be gayer than for many years, and intimations already made show that the King intends to make frequent appearances in public places of amusement during the coming months.
