Affairs in London.

A dispatch from London says:—In the
course of a few days the year's mourning of
the royal family for the late Queen will be
over, and the Court will resume a brighter
aspect. The West End is full of prepara-
tions for the new order of things, and it is
clear, from many indications, that their Maj-
esties desire the London season to be as
cheerful as conditions will permit. Many
families are in mourning because of losses in
South Africa, and, for various reasons, it is
presumed Queen Alexandra, Princess Chris-
tian and Princess Henry of Battenburg will
continue their predilection for the more
neutral tones in ordinary wear. But the as-
pect of society will be rarer than for many
years, and intimations already made show
that the King intends to make frequent ap-
pearances in public places of amusement
during the coming months.

Henry Norman, whose practical knowledge
of foreign affairs and American relations
renders him a most useful member of the
Commons, will bring out an important diplo-
matic secret. He will ask the Under Secre-
tary for Foreign Affairs whether at the out-
break of war between the United States and
Spain any communications was received from
the Austrian or other Government relating
to a proposal for a joint collective action by
the European States, and what was the
nature of the reply made by the British
Government.

It has been an open secret in diplomatic
circles in London and Washington that a pro-
posal for collective action was made by
Austria and strongly supported by one or
more European powers, and that the British
Government rendered the United States a
most important service in blocking the coal-
ition and even threatening to join fleets with
the Americans against it.
