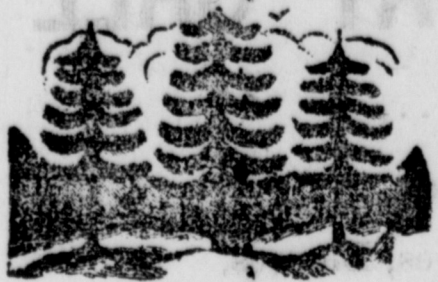

## Burning Waste of Clackmannan.

About 70 years ago a gang of illicit distillers, compelled to carry on their unlawful trade in solitary places, found a disused pit on the estate of the South Sauchie Colliery which admirably suited their purpose, and, with caution, long continued to prosecute their secret trade.

One day, however, they discovered that their furnace, operating on the side of the old subterranean passage in which they worked, had caused a smouldering fire in the almost exhausted seam of coal. Failing to extinguish it, they were soon compelled by the smoke to abandon their tools and stock and fly from the place.

After their departure the fire in the old pit continued to smoulder, until the flames, issuing forth, were observed at night from distant places. The fire baffled all efforts to extinguish it, and burnt on from year to year, until a seam of coal twenty-six acres in extent became embraced in it, and the district became known as the "burning waste of Clackmannan."

At length the proprietor of the mine determined to build a wall of mud completely round the burning mass, so as to deprive it, as far as possible, of air. Five years were employed in this work, and no less than £16,000 expended, but without success, for the fire continued to spread, and rage for thirty years, spreading alarm through the neighborhood, until it was at last extinguished by pouring into the mine an immense body of choke damp forced in by a high pressure jet of steam. For several hours the flood of gas poured in until the mine contained 8,000,000 cubic feet. The absence of free oxygen in choke damp put out the fire, and a subsequent stream at a lower temperature cooled the mass, and at length when the mine was fairly opened the fire was found to be utterly extinguished.

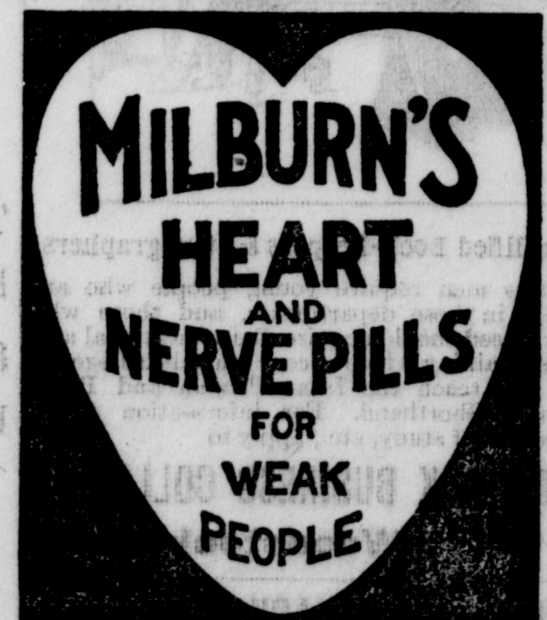

## Where Roquefort Cheese is Made.

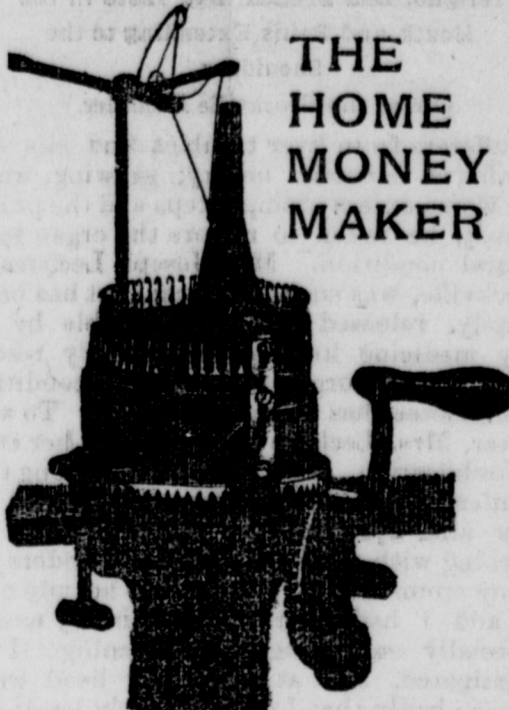
On a mountain side, 2,000 feet above the surrounding level, in the department of Aveyron, France, there is found, says Major Alvord, writing in the American Agriculturist, a snug little town, solidly built of stone, upon terraces. This is where the famous Roquefort cheese is made. The rocks tower above the town 1,000 or 1,200 feet more. The face of the mountain has a crescent shape, with this queer settlement clinging to the deepest part of the concave surface, and with a northeast outlook, so that the village experiences a very short day and lies in the shadow of the cliffs most of the time. The mountain behind the town is full of fissures, caverns, and passages. And through these caves there are strong currents of cool, moist air, and little streams of water. The temperature of these caves is about 45 degrees throughout the year. The water flowing from numerous springs, sometimes passing through dwellings and factories, has just about the temperature that is ordinarily recognized as "ice-water."

These natural caves and their uniform atmospheric conditions appear exactly suited to the slow-curing process and the growth of the blue mold which give the characteristics to the famous cheese of Roquefort. But the important fact must also be taken into account that this cheese is made from the milk of ewes instead of cows. The milk of sheep contributes additional peculiarities, being especially rich in fat, abundant in casein, and having characteristic flavors.

All we require is that you use the machine according to directions. The Machine being made expressly for this purpose, and the operation so simple, it cannot possibly make a mistake in its work.

The great demand now is for Bicycle Stockings, Women's Socks, and Motormen's Mittens, and as we are unable to supply the demand, have taken this method of advertising for more help.

## A Terrible Enemy.

The grey whale, a huge mammal which inhabits the North Pacific Ocean, and is most often found along the American coast, particularly in the Gulf of California, makes so vigorous a fight when attacked and is so terrible an adversary that it is known among sailors as the devil fish. Mr. Frank Bullen gives, in the Cornhill Magazine, a vivid picture of the destruction wrought by one of these whales when infuriated.

It is a standing order among the whales never to injure a calf when the mother is near. Neglect of this order was the cause of the catastrophe. A fleet of 13 American whale ships was off the coast of Lower California, and 52 boats, four from each ship, were out. In some way, in striking a large cow whale, a harpoon transixed her calf, which was at her side, and killed it instantly.

The mother quickly satisfied herself that the calf was dead, and then turned upon her aggressors like a veritable demon of destruction.

While carefully avoiding the exposure of her body to attack, she spread devastation among the flotilla. When she rose to the surface it was but for a second, to emit an expiration like the hiss of a lifting safety-valve, and at the same instant to destroy a boat or complete the destruction of one already hopelessly damaged. Every blow was dealt with accuracy and an appearance of premeditation. The speed of the monster was so great that she appeared almost simultaneously at widely separated points. Not content with dealing one tremendous blow at a boat, and reducing it to a bundle of loose boards, she attacked the wreckage again and again.

Utter demoralization seized even the veterans. The distance to the shore was great, and the huge whale, so far from spending her fury, seemed only to grow more desperately in earnest as the work of destruction went on. At last two boats succeeded in reaching the beach. The crew had hardly leaped over-

board to run their craft up, when close behind them in the shallow water appeared their relentless enemy. She was just too late.

Out of the fifty-two boats only two escaped undamaged. More than fifty men were badly injured, and six, one of whom was the unfortunate originator of the mischief, were killed outright.
