### Carleton County Agricultural Society—Sale of Pigs.

The Carleton County Agricultural Society, which is sixty years of age, is probably the oldest in the county, and was never so much alive as it is today. It held an exhibition in Woodstock last fall, will hold one this fall, and a poultry and pet stock show in January. Recently it imported ten pure bred pigs which were sold on the post office grounds on Saturday afternoon. This spring it imported pure seeds for its members. It with other societies in the County will give a bonus to the man who will buy one of the Government imported coach horses. ### The Drives.

The drives on the Tobique are all in the limits of the Tobique Corporation, and J. E. McCollom is pushing that vigorously. F. H. Hale is holding his cut on the Gulquac in the mouth of that stream, about 14 miles above Plaster Rock, and as soon as the Tobique Corporation is driven, he will drive into his mill. Mr. Morrison, who has the St. John Corporation from Grand Falls to Spring Hill, is pushing the work. On Tuesday of last week, the first drive from Woodstock reached the boom, and another drive was at once begun from Woodstock. On Friday, a drive left Grand Falls, and one left Aroostook. The Corporation is divided into six sections, of which J. J. Hale has the one from Hartland to Woodstock. There are five crews of men at work beside Mr. Hale's. About 80 men and 3 pairs of horses are employed. Mr. Morrison and his foreman, Mr. Potts, went north last Thursday, looking over the situation. They feel in very good spirits over the prospect.

Shaw, a prominent agriculturist and politician of the maritime province, and Miss Annie deBertrand Lugin, second daughter of Chas. H. and Mrs. Lugin, Victoria, B. C. The bride, who is one of Victoria's popular young ladies, is not only a talented vocalist, but has won much credit with her literary work, having published a number of essays and magazine articles, poems and short stories, etc., which have attracted considerable note.

### ACCIDENT TO ABERDEEN

A strange and somewhat singular accident happened the Aberdeen this afternoon after coming through the draw of the bridge. After dodging the logs all the way from Woodstock she had the misfortune to get a large spruce stick caught in the paddle wheel, the log being fastened in the circle so that it could not find its way out. The next revolution of the wheel took it up and broke off the frame work around the paddle-wheel slightly damaging the wheel itself.

### Log Driving Company.

The annual meeting of the St. John Log Driving Co. was held at the Queen hotel last week. President W. H. Murray was in the chair and those present were Messrs. F. D. Miles and E. H. Murchie, of St. John, Parker Glasier, R. A. Estey, A. H. F. Randolph D. Fraser, jr., and J. A. Morrison.

The accounts of the past year were submitted by the Secretary-Treasurer, J. Fraser Gregory, and passed. The balance on hand after paying all expenses and charges is about \$2,000.

Considerable dissatisfaction was expressed at the meeting, as it has been among the lumbermen, with the way in which the driving was done last season. A balance of \$2,600 was withheld from the contractors for the corporation drive, Messrs. Morrison & Noble, and the meeting agreed that this balance should be paid in fall to Mr. Morrison, who has bought out the share in the contract held by the late Mr. Noble.

It was decided to put an inspector of driving upon the river this season, he to be appointed by the directors.

The company drove about one hundred millions of lumber last season, all of which was rafted at Fredericton and Springhill. The expense of driving was about \$15,000. Fe'ton Gleaner.

### OBITUARY.

#### Mrs. William R. Snow.

It was with a severe shock that it was learned on Sunday afternoon that Mrs. William R. Snow had died suddenly. Mrs. Snow had been out on Saturday, apparently in the best of health. She was taken ill on Saturday afternoon with acute peritonitis, caused by a perforation of the stomach. She died on Sunday afternoon after suffering intensely. On Monday evening at nine o'clock the Ven Archdeacon Neales conducted a funeral service at the house and on Tuesday morning the remains were taken to St. Andrews for interment, accompanied by the husband and Nathan Treadwell of St. Andrews. Mrs. Snow leaves beside a husband, two sisters, Mrs. Robert Law, of San Francisco, and Mrs. Richard Bull, of Oakland, and a brother, Edward, in the west. She was a lady who was very highly respected by all who knew her. The bereaved husband has the sincere sympathy of the entire community.

#### William F. Smith.

William F. Smith died at his residence, Main Street, Woodstock, on Tuesday morning after a brief illness of pneumonia, in his seventy second year. Mr. Smith was born in Fredericton. He came to Woodstock when a young man, and was for many years engaged in the business conducted by his uncle, the late Hon. Charles Perley. He married Miss Fisher, sister of L. P. Fisher, Judge of Probate and of the late Judge Fisher. Mrs. Smith and one daughter, Miss Ella Smith, on the teaching staff in the College building here survive.

At one time Mr. Smith was engaged in a commercial enterprise in British Columbia when he was joined by his son Harry Smith, B. A., who lost his life in a drowning accident there. Up to a few days of his death he was in excellent health. His death was a severe shock to a large circle of friends and relatives. He was a consistent member of the Methodist church.

#### John Smith.

John Smith died at his home at Upper Woodstock on Monday afternoon at the advanced age of 82 years. He had been able to be about the house all day but was taken suddenly ill in the afternoon, dying almost immediately. For many years Mr. Smith conducted a tailoring business at Upper Woodstock. One son, William, conducts the Queen Hotel, St. Stephen, and one son is in the west, and a daughter, Mrs. Robert Fitzsimmons, resides in Woodstock.

#### Death of Principal Grant.

The Rev. Dr. George M. Grant, Principal of Queens University, Kingston, Ont., died at his home on Saturday morning. Principal Grant was born in Pictou County, N. S., sixty-seven years ago. He was educated at the Academy at Pictou and at Glasgow University. After a successful pastorate of the largest Presbyterian church in Halifax for some years, he was, in 1877, called to the principalship of Queens University, which position he occupied at the time of his death.

A severe thunder shower visited the middle section of Carleton County on Friday, accompanied by sharp lightning and hail. No damage is reported.

### Let us Change Our Time.

About June 15th all the railroads in the Maritime Provinces will adopt Atlantic standard time, which is 30 minutes faster than Woodstock local time, and an hour faster than Eastern standard time, now in use by the C. P. R. The cities of St. John and Fredericton have adopted the Atlantic standard, and it would be well for the citizens of Woodstock to consider its adoption. It is true that Woodstock tried Eastern standard a few years ago, and being dissatisfied with it, went back to local; but one of the chief reasons urged against Eastern standard time was that it was too slow. It is a noted fact that many people are fond of a fast time, and in the rural districts every housewife religiously keeps her clock a little fast. Atlantic standard ought to recommend itself to these people, as it does to all the business men in town for another reason.

It is to be hoped that the Town Council and the Board of Trade will take up the matter of the adoption of Atlantic standard time, so that we will not be eternally troubled with two standards in town.

### Reformed Baptist Camp Ground.

Rev. W. B. Wiggins and wife returned to town by steamer Aberdeen, on Saturday evening. Mr. Wiggins was at Beulah Camp Grounds attending to the matter of providing additional water supply by bringing water from a boiling spring on the hillside, about half a mile away. The spring is sufficient for all future needs of the grounds. He reports that the grounds are being made additionally beautiful by the opening up of avenues and gravelled walks, and by the planting of trees and flowering shrubs and plants of various kinds, through the generosity of Mr. Jno. F. Bullock, of St. John, who has personally superintended the matter, and the fixing of the entrance by fancy gates and turnstiles. Mr. Bullock is taking a great interest in the work. Mr. Wiggins found that a number of cottages, including his own, had been entered last autumn, and furniture destroyed and property stolen by some boys, as has been reported in the papers. The loss is greater than was at first supposed. The Reformed Baptist Camp Meeting, which opens June 29th this year, will be of unusual interest, as Mrs. Amanda Smith, a world-wide celebrated evangelist of Chicago, is expected to be present. Mrs. Smith is a colored lady.

### Woodstock Market.

With all the producers of produce busy one would not expect Woodstock market to be very brisk, which it isn't. Eggs are scarce and there is a ready sale for them at 12 cents per dozen. There is plenty of butter coming in, that in pound prints, wrapped in parchment, is worth from 16cts. to 17cts. Yellow eye beans are worth from \$2.00 to \$2.15 per bus. Oats stand at 45cts. Lamb is worth 13cts., veal 4cts., pork 7cts., mutton 5cts. and beef from 6cts. to 7cts. Many farmers are holding beef for higher prices, but it is doubtful if any higher prices will be forthcoming for the class of beef that is being held.
