Albanians and Turks Fight.

GETTINJE, Montenegro, Feb. 24.—Sixty-four men are reported to have been killed or wounded during fighting which occurred on the Montenegro frontier between Albanians and Turkish regular troops. 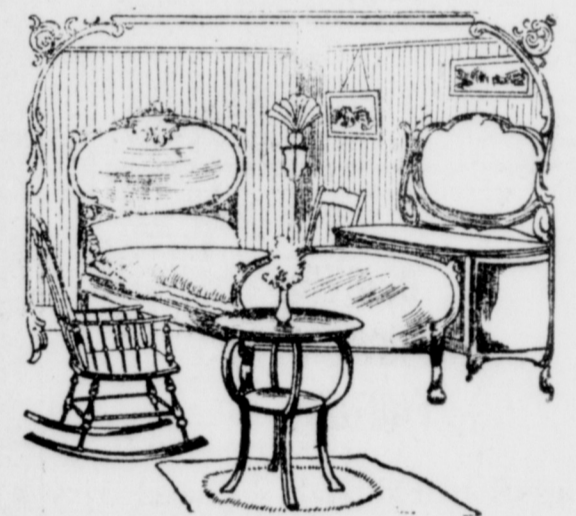
