Comity of Missions in China.

From The Shanghai Mercury.

The Universal Gazette publishes some rules which the Protestant churches at work in the Ningpo district have agreed upon as consonant with the comity of missions. The preamble states that formerly there was discord between churches, because of the stupidity of some of the adherents, and therefore, in the interests of peace, four rules have been mutually agreed upon to guide future relations.

First—Converts may unite with whichever of the six contracting churches they please. But if they have had dealings with another church, or been enquirers elsewhere, the pastor whose church they desire to enter must first ascertain all the facts from the former church, and only after it is found that their past history is all right will they be received. If it is found that they have law suits with other church members still pending, they will not be received.

Second—If one church has planted a chapel in any place, another church will not do likewise within a radius of ten li. If a church wishes to erect another chapel within a radius of 20 li, it shall first consult with the church which first had a chapel in that region. Outside the 20 li radius all will be free to do as they think best.

Third—If the members of one church have dealings with the members of another, the preachers should first inform the Western pastor for consultation. But if the matter only concerns their own church it does not come under this rule.

Fourth—A member expelled from one church will not be received into another. But if the expelled give real proof of repentance he may be received, provided the pastor of the church from which he was expelled be first consulted regarding the case.

A lady was once talking to the present Archbishop of Canterbury about the dispensations of Providence, and was rather boring him. To illustrate her argument she related to him how an aunt of hers had been going to America; she had decided the date of departure and taken her passage, when at the last moment she was prevented from going. The ship eventually sank and all the passengers and crew were drowned, and the lady looked upon this as a special dispensation of Providence, and inquired of the Archbishop if he did not think so too. "I don't know your aunt," was the reply.

No More Deputations.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier repeated at Toronto, on 17th ult., that "no more deputations would be sent to Washington" in regard to tariff matters. He had become convinced that the policy of the United States was such as to offer no more favourable opportunities for Canadian goods entering the American market. The premier said: "Canada could produce all that the United States could produce," which, however true in the main, has limitations. Canada cannot, for instance, grow oranges, or high grade tobacco, or cotton. He had hopes of Canada being as large a wheat producer as the States in 15 years, and the Canadian steel industry promised to rival that of her neighbor. Canada, said Sir Wilfrid, "was willing to exchange her goods for those of the countries with which she traded, and in the long run Canada would displace the United States in the British market."

It is inspiring to hear such hopeful words from the Premier, who evidently had a patriotic tonic administered by his experience on the Joint High Commission, of futile memory.—Insurance & Finance Chronicle.

The War.

The war in South Africa has long since become wearisome from its monotony. Capturing, or dispersing gangs of what the Hon. Mr. Balfour, in a recent speech, called "bandits," is not war, it is police work on a larger scale than usual. The capture of Kritzinger, one of the chiefs of these marauders, is important, as he had shown signs of military talent a little higher than the skill to sneak away. Any reader of Lord Roberts' work on India, will be convinced that the Boer are not nearly as plucky as the Afghans, or men of the hill tribes that General had to punish and keep in order. The end of the trouble will not be long delayed in the judgment of many who are in a position to judge. The Canadians who are leaving for South Africa in January are therefore likely to be "in at the death." They will be on hand to take their share in the appointments that will be made for maintaining the peace in the two subdued districts, or, if they so prefer, they will find wide opportunities for trading when the land is pacified. Canada's brilliant record in South Africa will be one of the highest pages in the history of the war, and her success in the field of commerce will, we trust, be equally marked.—Insurance & Finance Chronicle.
