MICHAEL BYRNES, an old Crimean Veteran who has lived in Woodstock for many years, died here after a long illness on Friday night. He was a native of Ireland and when a young man he enlisted in the 20th regt. Lancashire Fusiliers and went with them to the Crimea. He was in the battles of Alma, Inkerman and Balaklava. He was severely wounded more than once and was discharged as unfit for service. Two sons of Mr. Byrnes', who survive, will be taken to an orphanage at St. John.
