**DOAN'S.****Dooley on Peace in the Philippines.**

Commenting on the climate in the Philippine Islands, Mr. Dooley says:

"Th' climate is simply hivenly. No other wurrd describes it. A white man who goes there seldom rayturnes unless th' bereaved famly insists. It is jus' right. In winter enough rain, in summer plenty iv heat. Iv coorse, ye know how 'tis done. A Filipino, we'll say, niver heard iv th' histiry iv this country. He is met be iv our sturdy boys in black and blue iv Macabeebe scouts, who asts him to cheer fr' Abraham Lincoln. He rayfuses. He is thin placed upon the grass an' given a dhrink, a baynit bein' fixed in his mouth so he cannot reject th' hispitality. Undher th' infloence iv th' hose that cheers but does not inebriate, he soon warrums or perhaps I might say swells up to a realization iv th' granjoir iv his adoptive country. One gallon makes him give three groans fr' th' constitchoochion. At four gallons, he will ask to be wrapped in th' flag. At th' dew pint he sings 'Yankee Doodle.' . . ."

"Nachrally we have had to take a good many customs fr'm the Spanyard, but we have improved on thim. I was talkin' with a Spanish giutleman th' other day who had been away fr' a long time an' he said ye wudden't know th' country. Even the faces iv th' people on th' shreetes had changed. They seemed glad to see him."

**The Frying-Pan's Triumph.**

Western lines face an embarrassing situation in a dearth of married section men. Operating officials have done their best, but they are unable to cope with the problem. Sober, industrious single men are still obtainable, but they don't do. This is a case, an operating official said yesterday, "where the frying-pau triumphs over brains, and to be honest, we're up against it."

It is really the Mrs. Section Boss that is wanted. In the far West there are great stretches of line, each divided into five and six-mile sections, in charge of a boss and crew. Each has its section-house, where the wife of the boss boards the men.

During the winter many section bosses have found other work, and there is no one to cook in the section-houses. Wages have been advanced, but it has been found impossible to keep married men on some of the sections. The Montana Central has wired to St Paul for men, stating that there is great difficulty in keeping up the crews.

Only four men have been secured. Others have applied for jobs, but were unable to meet the requirements. Competent unmarried men were available, but without wives they were useless. With wages of \$55 a month and house rent free it has been found impossible to secure the right men.

As a result of the famine many section-houses have been closed, and the men have been sent to adjoining section-houses, at great inconvenience. In other cases single men have been compelled to fry and bake for the common good, and constant complaints and frequent resignations have resulted.

Little improvement in the situation is looked for until spring, since many of the sections are located on vast arid plains with nothing but wilderness for miles. Few women care to face the severity of a Western winter in such surroundings.—[St. Paul Pioneer Press.
