They are a dismal looking lot—the players. I never saw one of them smile, and the winners looked as miserable as the losers. Nobody gets away with any money, no matter how much he wins. At least it is very rare. I saw one man begin with a thousand-franc note—\$200. He played and won—doubled his money; played and won again, and again doubled. He kept on until he had won about \$24,000. Then he started resolutely to go out. At the door he stopped, hesitated, and turned back. He sauntered over to the table, and looked on at the game for a while. Then he buttoned up his coat again, with great decision, and started out with a firm stride. But he could not—positively could not get through the door. The last I saw of him he was playing away again, and the \$24,000 was going pell-mell back into the gambling-house coffers. I did see one man, however, win and go away with his money. He was a very rich man, as I happened to know, and just played for fun, not caring whether he won or not. He had astonishing luck. #### Natural Fountain Pen.

"All woodsmen know," says Paul Martin in *La Vie Scientifique*, "that pine needles grow in pairs in the same sheath and that when placed side by side the sharp pointed ends are exactly opposite. Fasten these two needles together by a thread quite near the pointed end, and you will have a pen with two sharp nibs, ready to write whatever you please. As a penholder insert the pen into a hollow twig, letting the points stick out about a centimeter (half inch). Dip your pen into an inkstand, letting it remain for a short time in the ink. The ink will rise by capillarity in the tube formed by the junction of the two needles and will form a reserve of liquid sufficient for the writing of twenty lines. The pen is fine, simple and antirustling."

#### Feeding Dairy Cattle.

Always feed at regular hours. To stand watching and waiting for food that should have been ready before is conducive only to worry, and that does not make milk or put on fat, says American Cultivator. Feed no more than can be eaten, and if any is left clean the troughs or mangers as soon as the cows seem to have had enough. In the short days of winter two good feeds a day have been found better than three. Do not feed before daylight or after dark and do not disturb them during the night unless the barn is on fire. They will be the better for a carding and brushing every day, not only for cleanliness' sake, but it puts the blood in circulation and invigorates them. Always treat them kindly and gently, because kindness is a good investment. Follow these rules, and there will be but little use for veterinarians or cow doctors.

#### Lincoln Told a Story.

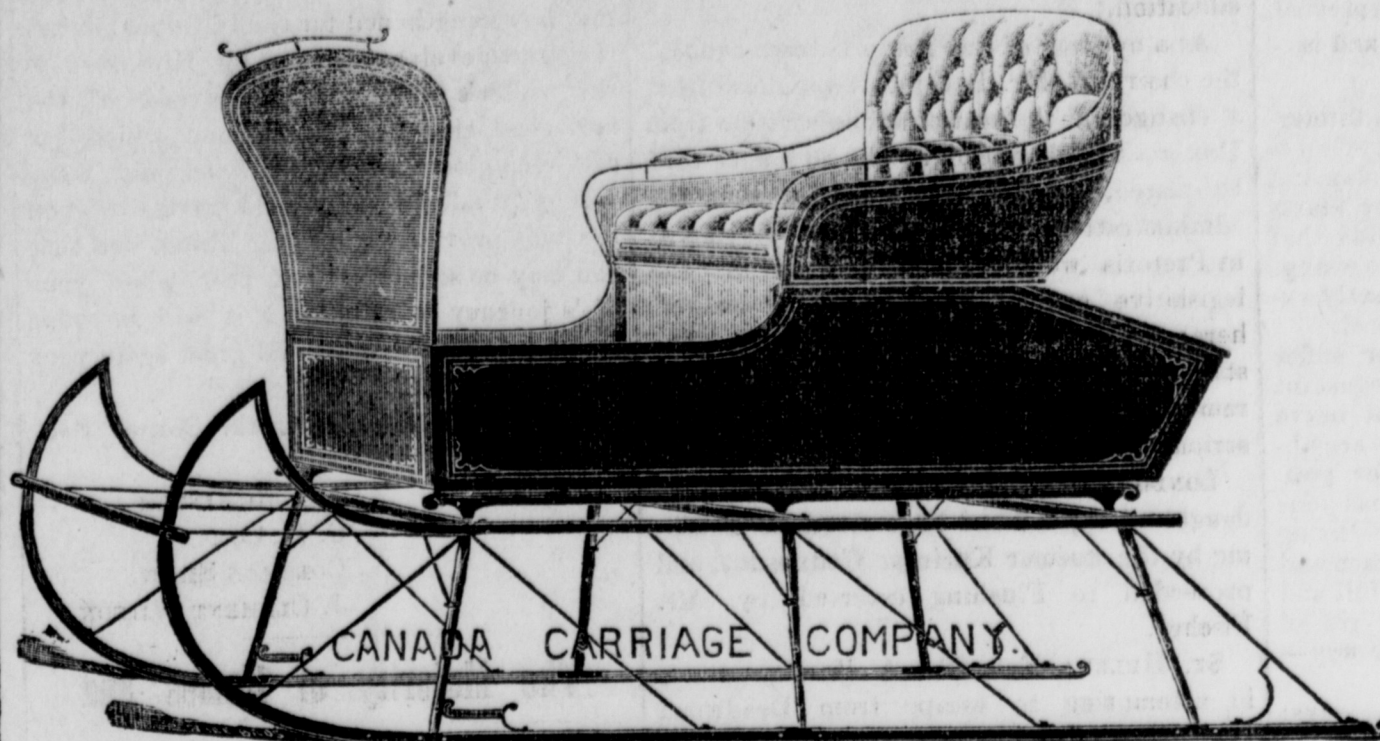
At one time a friend complained to President Lincoln that a certain cabinet officer was administering his office with unusual energy with the hope of securing the presidential nomination.

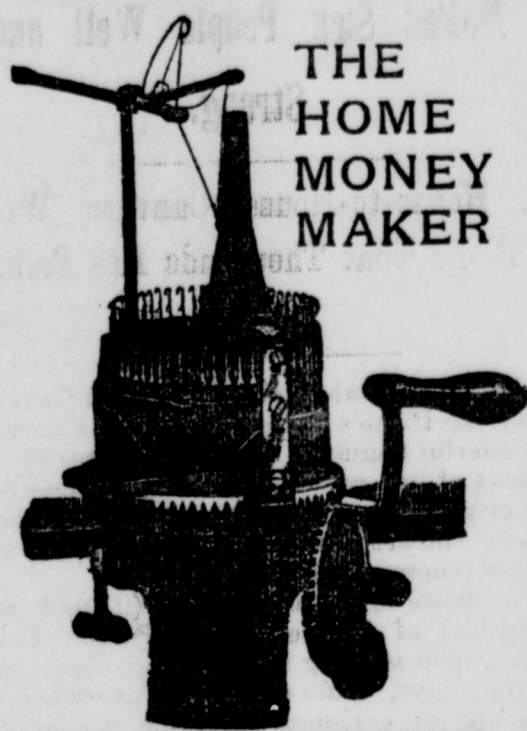
