## THE WAR IN SOUTH AFRICA.

London, March 1.—On the best informed opinion the Pall Mall Gazette prophesies the end of all serious hostilities in South Africa by September and this is rather a pessimistic than an optimistic view. Judging from Lord Kitchener's progress this week and the well founded rumors of General Botha's personal inclination to surrender, the practical end of the struggle may considerably ante date, September.

Details of Lord Kitchener's recent movement shows that he evidently picked the anniversary of Majuba as the time for a big success, by a combined movement lasting two days, against the Boer forces within the Harrismith and Van Reenen line of block-houses.

More than 600 Boers were either killed or prisoners; also 2,000 horses, 28,000 head of cattle, 200 wagons, 60,000 sheep, 600 rifles and 50,000 rounds of ammunition. The prisoners include General DeWet's son and his secretary, Commandants Meyer and Truher, and several field cornets.

Lord Kitchener gives a general review of the military situation in a late report. He says: "The enemy's forces in the field are now practically confined to four definite areas. In the Eastern Transvaal the personal influence of General Louis Botha continues to hold together a considerable but diminishing force between the borders of Swaziland and the Brugspruit-Waterval blockhouse line. In the west Generals Delarey and Kemp cling to the difficult country between the Mafeking Railway line and Magaliesburg. In the north-eastern districts of Orange River Colony De Wet and ex-President Steyn still control a comparatively large and determined following, who have quite recently given proofs of their boldness and initiative in attack, and in Cape Colony the country to the northwest of the Cape Town-De Aar line is infested by several bands of rebels, kept together by adventurers from the late republics. Elsewhere smaller commandoes are to be found, but their want of enterprise reveals in all probability an abating interest in the useless struggle in which they have so long been employed."

Pretoria, Feb. 28.—Three thousand Boers, resident in the Pietersburg refugee camp, are being removed in a body to Colenso. During the last three weeks transferences from the different camps in the Transvaal to the coast towns of Natal have been going on at the rate of 1,000 a week. There are now more than 60,000 men, women, and children in the Transvaal camps and more than 45,000 in those of the Orange River Colony.

One hundred and fifty persons have escaped this month from the Pietersburg camp in consequence of Commandant Beyers' raid in that district. Those who have got away have been mostly young men. The inmates of the camps are becoming more contented,

The death rate is now practically normal. In the Transvaal there are now 18 camps, each one virtually a village. They contain 25,000 children, the majority of whom are receiving education.]

At a meeting of the Pretoria town council, the chairman, Mr. Lovejoy, announced that a change of the seat of administration from Pretoria to Johannesburg was no longer contemplated, it was definitely settled that the administrative department now established in Pretoria would remain here, and that the legislative council would hold its sessions here; the courts would open in April. The statement has caused the greatest satisfaction, removing the disquietude which had had a serious effect upon business.

LONDON, Feb. 28.—General Botha's two daughters, aged 7 and 13, arrived at Flushing by the steamer Kurfurst Wednesday, and proceeded to Flushing escorted by Mr. Fischer.

ST. HELENA, Feb. 28.—A Boer prisoner, in attempting to escape from Deadwood Camp Thursday evening, was shot by a sentry of the Wiltshire Regiment, the bullet lodging in the chest. The prisoner died on the following day.

LONDON, Feb. 27.—A despatch from Pretoria says: A list of twenty-five additional Boer leaders permanently banished has been published. It includes five commandants and two former members of the Rand.

OTTAWA, March 2.—(Special)—A cable from the casualty department, Cape Town, South Africa, reports that Charles Cameron, S. A. C., died of enteric fever at Springfontein. His next of kin is R. G. Foster, 52 St. Patricks street, Montreal.

Joseph Chamberlain cables that A. Minson is seriously ill at Muzurab. His next of kin is Donald Minson, Dunleith, Northwest Territories.

R. Burton is seriously ill at Elandsfontein; next of kin Mrs. Jackson, Moose Lake, Halifax.

Theodore Goodman is seriously ill at Muzurab; next of kin, sister, Mrs. Doherty, Winnipeg.

Albert Watson Slauffer is seriously ill at Muzurab; next of kin Robert Slauffer, Edmonton, Northwest Territories.

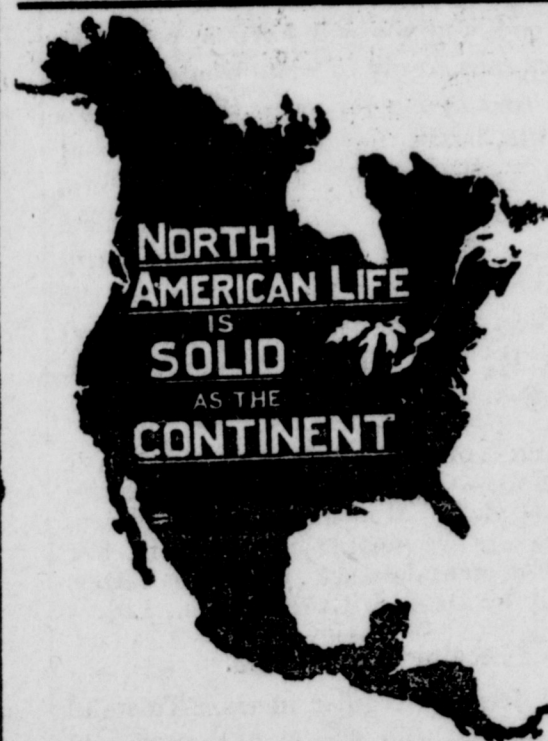

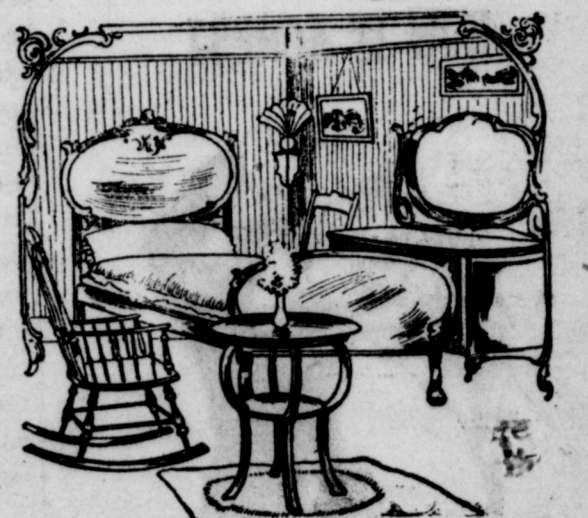
