"His Majesty, Robert De Vere."

The Lord Lieutenantcy of Ireland remains still one of the highest and best paid offices in the empire. The salary of the Viceroy has fallen £10,000 from the figure at which it stood 70 years ago, but it is still £20,000, and the Lord Lieutenant has, besides, an "outfit" allowance of £5000. Time was, however, when the "Governor of Ireland" wielded a power which would startle Lord Cado-gan if it were suggested that he should take it up. Robert De Vere, Earl of Oxford and first Marquis of Dublin, held the office "together with the rights of mixed and unmixed empire, and with all other jurisdiction high or low"; and he had been Viceroy hardly a year when there were granted to him "the islands bordering on Ireland." The Pope sent him a "consecrated diadem" which Robert did not dare to wear, the King created him "Duke of Ireland," and his power in the country was so absolute, indeed, that he had the right to coin money. Yet Robert De Vere was never in the Emerald Isle. King in all but name, he never saw his kingdom.

If any member shall refuse or neglect to pay the sum assessed upon him as his portion of loss and expense after thirty days notice the association may collect the same by legal process. The association shall not be liable for loss or damage sustained by any member whose assessment as aforesaid remains unpaid after said thirty days and said non-liability shall continue until all such assessments due are paid or collected. Difference as to loss or damage shall be determined by sworn appraisers chosen by each party and all claims shall be paid in sixty days after settlement.

The affairs of the association shall be conducted by a board of directors chosen at the regular annual meeting of members in the Town of Woodstock each member having one vote only.
