DEATH OF THE VERY REV. MONSIGNOR CONNOLLY.

A Reverend Gentleman Well Known and Highly Respected in Carleton County.

The Very Rev. Monsignor Connolly died at St. John the Baptist parish rectory, St. John, on Wednesday morning of last week. He was born in St. John on the 4th of March 1823 of parents who had come from the north of Ireland. He received his early education in the common schools of the day in St. John and Fredericton.

(Having determined to enter the service of his church, he went to St. Andrew's College (now St. Dunstan's) at Charlottetown, where he spent four years; he next studied philosophy and theology at the University of Quebec, and was ordained a priest at Chatham, N. B., by Right Rev. Bishop Dollard, the first bishop of New Brunswick, on July 18th, 1848.

The young priest was first appointed a curate at Fredericton, where he assisted Rev. Walter Edwards for one year. In 1849 he was placed in charge of the mission at Woodstock, N. B., where he remained three years. This mission was one hundred miles in extent and embraced Grand Falls, Aroostook, Tobique, Eel River, Nackawick, in New Brunswick, and Houlton, in Maine. He was next sent to Barachois, a French mission in West-land county, and thence to Milltown, St. Stephen, where he remained a year, after which he returned to Woodstock for a period of fourteen years. From Woodstock Mgr. Connolly was removed to St. John city, and was in 1868 made Vicar-General. Four years later he went Grand Digue for a year and a half, and thence to Woodstock for three years. Mgr. Connolly was placed in charge of Carleton in December, 1876, succeeding the deeply mourned Father Dumphy. In 1889 Mgr. Connolly was transferred to St. John the Baptist church, Lower Cove, where he has since labored. It was in 1890 that His Holiness the Pope made him a member of the papal household with the title of Monsignor.

Everybody is more or less familiar with the good work, materially, done by Monsignor Connolly in St. John, but it may be mentioned that after taking charge of St. John the Baptist parish he had the inside of the church painted and decorated at a cost of \$1,000, of which he paid every dollar himself. He also built and finished the fine three-story brick parochial residence on Broad street at a cost of about \$7,000, and had repairs made to the church, making an expenditure of over \$10,000. He displayed untiring energy and marvellous industry in the country parishes in which he had worked. He built St. Gertrude's church at Woodstock; St. Thomas De Villonora's, at Richmond; St. Bartholomew's, at Johnville; St. William's, at Canterbury; St. Dominick's, at Allandale, and St. Bonaventure's at Williamstown. He also finished the inside of the church of St. Teresa at Cape Bald, and built and finished the St. Rose church at Fairville, as well as the pastor's residence.

Monsignor Connolly had much to do with the settlement of Johnville, Carleton county, where under the advice of the late Bishop Sweeny many St. John men made their

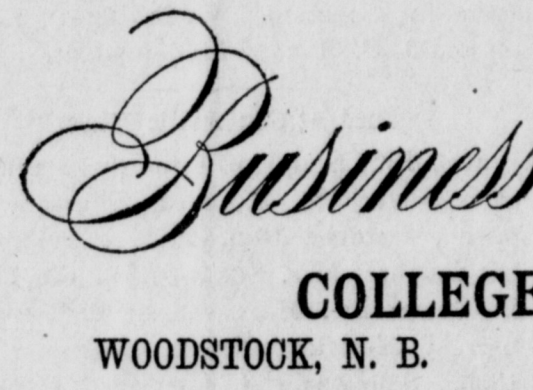

A writer in the New York Catholic Herald in August, 1885, said: "The families who first settled in what was then an unclaimed wilderness some 20 years ago were very poor and would have had to abandon the settlement were it not for the aid and efforts of Father Connolly, who begged for them and spent his own money to clothe and feed them. So long as the present stock and their descendants inherit the earth, the name of Father Connolly will never be forgotten at Johnville."

During his long and busy life Mgr. Connolly was an active worker in the total abstinence cause. Thirty years ago he gave great assistance to St. Malachi's Society and the Father Mathew Association. Later on he was president of the union of New Brunswick Catholic temperance societies. He very frequently lectured on total abstinence.

Mgr. Connolly was a type of the clergyman whose whole life and thoughts are bound up in the work of the church—in the salvation of souls. No labor was too great for him to undertake in the pursuance of his sacred calling. He was ever zealous and indefatigable, and was in every sense of the word a truly good man. His friends were to be found not only in the Catholic church, but among the public generally throughout the province, for he was highly esteemed and respected wherever he was known.
