

MGR. CONNOLLY'S FUNERAL.

Remains of the Esteemed Prelate Interred at the Hermitage Rectory.

The remains of the Very Reverend Monsignor Thomas Connolly, vicar general of the diocese of St. John, were interred in the Connolly family lot at the Hermitage, Fredericton, Friday last.

The body of the noble and esteemed priest rested the last night in the rectory of the parish Lower Cove. They were removed to the church of St. John the Baptist at 10 o'clock in the morning in due and careful form, accompanied by a procession of clergy and bearers of the pall. The office of the dead began as soon as the body reached the church. This was followed by Pontifical High Mass, His Lordship Bishop Casey being the celebrant. The sermon was preached by Rev. W. F. Chapman of Woodstock.

After the service the funeral procession was formed. It left the church at 1.30 p. m., and proceeded to the depot. A special train then left the depot. Arrangements had been made to take to Fredericton all the ladies and gentlemen who wished to pay their respects to the deceased clergyman.

The train reached Fredericton shortly after 4 o'clock and the remains were taken directly to the Hermitage.

Resignation of the Hon. J. L. Tarte.

The resignation of the Hon. J. Israel Tarte, Minister of Public Works, is expected to be announced at any moment. Those who have followed the Tarte campaign from the beginning have not looked for anything else. Indeed the minister of public works was so clearly guilty of such a gross breach of constitutional usage as made his continuance in the administration utterly impossible unless he receded from his position.

There is perhaps no other instance on record of a minister of the crown propounding and advocating a new born policy which was never submitted or considered by his leader or his colleagues in the cabinet. Everybody knows that to do so is wholly unconstitutional and to permit it would frustrate good government. To say that the minister of public works was actuated by a desire to force the hands of his leader and his colleagues would intensify, from a constitutional standpoint, the character of the offence instead of mitigating it.

The Town Horse.

It is stated on good authority that the town horse was not at Meductic when the fire alarm sounded last Saturday morning. He was only about a mile from the Engine house, in a gravel pit, where the driver could only with the greatest difficulty hear the alarm. If the town gets a scorching some day because the horse is taking his Christmas holidays hauling gravel when the fire alarm rings, perhaps then the horse will be kept somewhere in the vicinity of the hose cart.

The Hospital.

Since the opening of the Carleton County hospital two months ago eighteen patients have been admitted, of which twelve have been discharged, practically cured, and five others now there are doing well. There have been only one death, that of Mr. Owens, whose case was practically hopeless when he was admitted.

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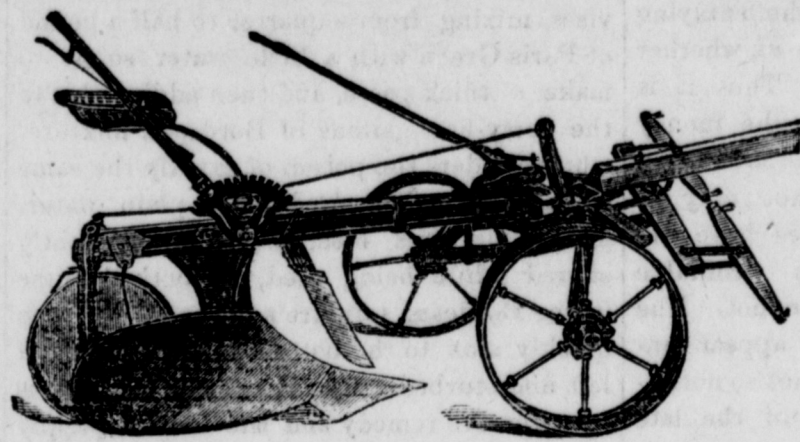
