St. Paul is no longer a pioneer village; it is an important city. It is known among other things as a "railway centre"; and it has high office buildings with express elevators and revolving doors, a network of eleccourt house, at least three streets in which the shop windows are civilized, four large hotels, and innumerable apartment houses .-Saturday Evening Post.
