The advantages connected with the ploughing under of clover may be summed up as

1. There is an enrichment of the soil by the addition of nitrogen obtained from the atmosphere.

2. There is an increase to the store of available mineral plant food (phosphoric acid, potash and lime) in the surface soil taken by the clover in part from depths not reached by the shallower root systems of other farm

3. There is a large addition of humus, whereby the soils is made more retentive of moisture, warmer and better aerated, conditions favorable to vigorous crop growth. Humus also furnishes the material best adapted for the development of those forms of germ life that act so beneficially in the soil.

4. As an agent for deepening and mellowing soils, no crop gives such satisfactory results as clover.

5. Clover also serves a useful purpose as a catch crop during the autumn months, when the crop would be otherwise bare, retaining fertilizing material brought down by the rain, and also that formed in the soil during the summer months, much of which would otherwise be lost through the leaching action



A New Way to Burn Kerosene.

The discovery of the fact that an ordinary hallow, porous, terra cotta brick, after being plunged for a few seconds in kerosene oil may be lighted and burned for nearly an hour throwing out a fierce heat at small cost, bids fair to be an important factor in solving the fuel problem for the poor people in large cities. Bricks thus treated may be burned in the fire box of an ordinary cook stove. These bricks have been used for number of years past in fire proof constructed for lining ceilings and in partitions.

A New York Sun reporter who called upon Mr. Adolph Muller, of the firm of Henry Maur & Son, manufacturers of this style of brick, writes of what he saw in the following

The bricks are made in various shapes and sizes. The most convenient fit for the ordinary kitchen range is about eight inches long, a little less that four wide and about two and a quarter inches thick. In showing the Sun reporter recently how one of these could be used. Mr. Muller dropped it on its side in a tin wash basin half full of kerosene. When it had lain there half immersed for ten seconds he turned it over and soaked the other side. Then he fished it out by putting the end of a stick through the hallow, set it down on two ordinary bricks

and applied a match. "The oil in the brick slowly began to burn very much as a piece of channel coal or highly combustible wood might have done. In ten seconds the brick was throwing out from all sides a flame which rose to a height of about two feet. The heat could be felt five All kinks of TIN and GRANITE feet away.

"At the end of half an hour the brick was burning as steadily as ever. To show how eastly it could be extinguished it was dropped into a pail of water, then fished out, soaked in oil again and relighted. It seemed to burn better after being in the water than it did when first lighted. The brick itself, except for coming out black after burning a while, was the same as ever. The flame given out was clear and sootless. Aftersoaking in oil for less than half a minute a brick seemed likely to burn for about an hour.

"I hold," said the exponent of brick burning, "that this solves the fuel problem for the East Side at any rate. All that poor folks-or wealthier ones for that matterneed to do is to keep a few bricks and a kerosene bath handy and the old coal stove is just as good as it ever was. You can use the bricks in the stove. Of course you can't heat very large buildings in this way, but if we are to have plenty of soft coal, as they say there will be no need."

It would certainly look as if this simple and practical suggestion might prove a great blessing to the poor people in the cities before the winter is over if the present coal famine continues.


