(Boston Transcript.) Lord Strathcona's optimistic opinion at the meeting of the Hudson's Bay Company, that within a decade Canada would be able to supply all the foodstuffs to the United Kingdom seems to have been made with a view to impressing the English nation rather than to have been based on any substantial foundation. It must be owned, however, that Canadian visitors to Englann are making a decidedly strong impression in England to the future greatness of British North America, and that in this country the resources of Canada as a source of supply of the world's food is not often realized. The great Saskatchewan Valley, with its millions of acres of hard-wheat soil, has barely been prospected, in an agricultural sense, and it has been demonstrated that wheat can be matured at Fort MacMurray, only a little south of the latitude of York Factory, the port of Hudson's bay. The possibilities for grazing are unlimited, and the development of the country must inevitably be large, although a decade is not likely to witness the important change which Lord Strathcona predicts.

The Hudson's Bay Company, or, to give its quaint official title, 'The Governor and Company of Adventurers of England trading into Hudson's Bay,' must inevitably be a large factor in the Canadian North-West, asit has been in all Canada's past. Few people realize that the work of this corporation, one of the most powerful ever given a charter, is still going on, and that it is paying dividends of eight and a half per cent. The company was organized under a charter which gave it the power of life and death, permitting it to establish governments. In 1870, in exchange tor its territorial rights, the company received a cash payment of \$1,500,000 and the right to claim in any township within the 'Fertile Belt' one-twentieth of all the lands surveyed for settlement for the next fifty years. The company has now about four millions acres of land, and it is estimated that its total allotment under the terms of the 1870 contract will amount to 7,000,000

The shares of the company originally sold for \$100, but the sales of lands have reduced the capital stock indebtedness, making the shares \$65, these now selling at \$136 per share. The Hudson's Bay Company made one-half of its last year's profits, equal to a dividend of four and a quarter per cent, from its trading business. Besides this it has carried forward a sum equal to five per cent, on each share, and has investments in London and cash on hand amounting to more than a million dollars.

It is little wonder that Lord Strathcona, as the head of the company, should take a roseate view of the future of Canada. The influx of settlers into the Canadian North-West promises to be large, and the Hudson's Bay Company will continue to share, with the government to which it has surrendered its territorial privileges, in the development of what must sooner or later become a section which will come into direct and strong competition with the wheat fields and grazing regions of our own west.
