THE CAMP MEETING at Riverside, Aroostook County, Me., near Robinson's Station on the B. & A. railway six miles from Bridgewater opens on Friday next August 1st, and continues for eleven days. Revs. Stacey, Reynolds and wife as also a number of the Reformed Baptist ministers including Revs. G. W. Macdonald, G. B. Trafton, S. A. Baker, H. C. Archer, A. H. Trafton and W. B. Wiggins are expected to attend.

H. A. CONNELL is pushing the work on the dam at the mouth of the Meduznakeag. He has a new turbine wheel on the ground that will give him 263 horse power on an eleven feet head of water. He will tear down the old carding mill and will erect just this side of it a new building 30ft. x 32ft. for his motor. Mr. Connell expects in six weeks to be running his electric light plant and foundry by water power. He will tear down the old saw mill and build a new one. When he gets the whole plant fixed up and painted, it will greatly improve the appearance of the water front, beside giving him a large power at a comparatively small cost, which is, after all, almost as important a matter as the question of scenery.

CHALMER DERRAH, son of James Derrah, Hartland, arrived in Woodstock on Friday evening, from South Africa, and registered at the Victoria Hotel. Mr. Derrah enlisted in the Second Canadian Mounted Rifles on December 11th last and on the 31st of March, Easter Monday, he was wounded in the leg at Harts River. The only other New Brunswick man wounded in that celebrated fight was Lieut. Markham of St. John. Eleven other Canadians were killed and forty-four wounded. Two hundred and seventy horses were slaughtered. Before going to South Africa Trooper Derrah had been working at the blacksmith business at Glassville with Mr. Hanington. While in Africa he was one of the horse shoers in Troop No. 10. He is a fine looking stalwart fellow and just the sort we welcome back to his native land.
