

King May be Moved in Month.

LONDON, July 6.—The following bulletin was posted at 9 o'clock this morning at Buckingham Palace:

"The king's progress continues to be in every way satisfactory.
(Signed) TREVES, LAKING, BARLOW."

King Edward's progress to-night continues to be good. It is said that if his improvement proceeds at the present rate he will probably by the end of the month be well enough to be transferred to the royal yacht in Southampton waters.

After the morning bulletin was issued Queen Alexandra and Princess Victoria visited Marlborough House, where they attended divine service with the Prince and Princess of Wales. The queen stayed within Buckingham Palace for the rest of the day.

Most of the churches in the United Kingdom celebrated to-day the announcement that King Edward was out of danger, with informal thanksgiving services, special music and the singing of the national anthem.

The government has issued orders that the Indian colonial troops now in London shall postpone their departure indefinitely. This is due to the strongly expressed desire of the Indian contingent especially to see the king before they return home and also indicates an intention to keep the troops here until the coronation. The colonial and Indian troops will participate in the reception to Lord Kitchener when he arrives about July 12.

Anniversary of Pope's Coronation.

ROME, July 6.—This evening there were fetes at the vatican in celebration of the Pope's jubilee in honor of the 24th anniversary of his coronation. The entire papal court and thousands of members of all the Catholic societies represented in Rome assembled at 6 o'clock this evening in the great Belvedere court of the vatican and paid homage. The Pope occupied an especially constructed and richly adorned gallery. He was greeted with enthusiastic acclamations and the band played the Pontifical March as he entered. A chorus was sung by a choir of several hundred pupils from the clerical schools in Rome. The vatican officials, a number of ladies and the members of the diplomatic corps witnessed the scene from the windows overlooking the court.

The fete was brought to a close by the Pope pronouncing a pontifical blessing, after which he was again acclaimed. A great flock of pigeons sent to Rome from all the chief towns of Italy was then released and flew off to their homes, each one bearing an announcement that the ceremonies had taken place.

The Pope, who was delighted with the fete, was in excellent health and his physicians announce that he has improved in health and spirits in the past year. A dinner in celebration of the jubilee was given in the vatican at noon to 150 of the poor of Rome. Cardinal Respighi and a number of prelates and papal officials were present.

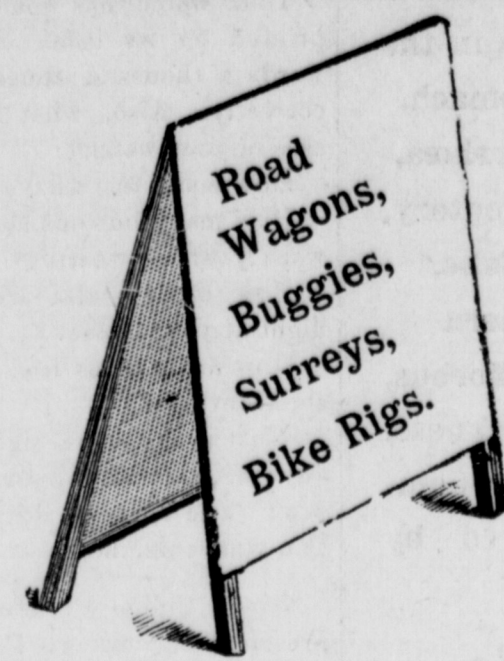

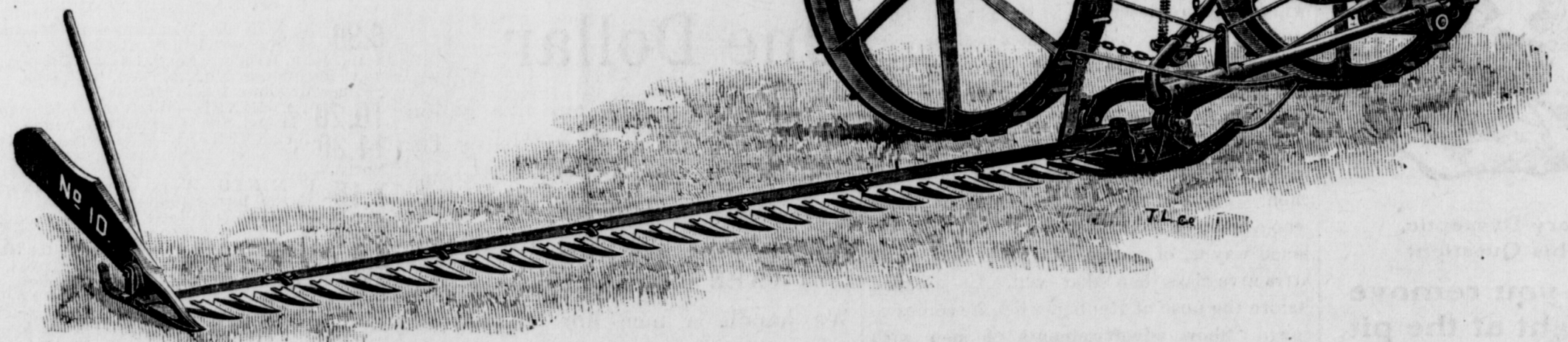
