Sending Cheese Too Green.

Ottawa, July 6.—(Special)—Prof. Robertson says the Montreal Produce Merchants' Association has received a report from the secretary of the Bristol Produce Association, stating that quantities of Canadian cheese are arriving too green and new and that this is likely, if continued, to have an injurious effect on the cheese trade. While the curing of cheese at low temperatures, not above 60 degrees Fahr., will produce the best quality, the cheese must be held for a period of not less than two weeks in the curing room to permit the ripening process to be well started before the cheese are put on the railway cars or steamships.
