The Warden said he was sure the Council did not require work to be done for nothing. He knew of Coun. Carvell having lost time, and he himself had been put to considerable expense.

Coun. Gallagher moved that \$25 each be paid to Warden Saunders and Coun. Carvell for their services on the building committee.

Coun. Williams seconded the motion.

Coun. McDonald did not think \$25 was any pay for the services rendered.

The motion carried.

Scott Act Inspector Coipitts presented the following report:

To the Warden and Councillors of the Municipality of the County of Carleton: Gentlemen,—I, Banfred Colpitts, Scott Act Inspector for the County of Carleton present my half yearly report:

Since the last session of the Council I have paid in expenses the sum of \$266.25. I have paid the Sec-Treas. \$101; my half yearly salary is \$150, making in all the sum of \$517.25.

I had on hand \$112.89. I collected in fines \$101, and I received from the Sec-Treas \$130, making \$348.89 which will leave the Council owing me the sum of \$173.36.

BANFRED COLPITTS.

Coun. Carvell said this spring, when Sheriff Hayward moved into the gaol, the question came before the building committee of supplying a telephone for county business. The sheriff preferred the line of the Union Telephone company, of which Dr. Ross is secretary, as he (Hayward) could reach better the part of

the county which he wished to be connected with than he could by any other line. He (Carvell) made an agreement with Dr. Ross, until this meeting of the Council, for \$10 a year for a phone, and 15 cents each for any message sent by councillors on county business. Some councillors thought connection should also be made with the Sec-Treas' office. An instrument in gaol and in Sec-Treas' office would cost \$20 a year.

A letter was read from Dr. Ross on the subject.

On motion Coun. Bohan, seconded Coun. Giberson, the building committee was empowered to make the best trade possible with the Union Telephone Co.

The appropriation asked for by Dr. Curtis, for smallpox and other contagious diseases, purposes came up for consideration.

Coun. Raymond thought it would not be necessary to act upon the estimates presented until the bills came before the Council. The estimates for the Grafton smallpox cases, particularly, should not be passed upon at present.

Warden Saunders pointed out that the Board of Health contracted all bills, and the duty of the Council appeared to be to vote the amount asked for, as the Board of Health had no resources to draw from, and needed the money to pay the bills that required prompt payment.

On motion the Sec-Treas was authorized to pay the bills as they came to him certified correct by the chairman of the Board of Health.

Adjourned sine die.
