They are putting in machinery for the grinding of plaster and expect to do a large business at it next season. They began too late this season to get much of it on the market, although their local sales have been large.

AS THE steamer Aberdeen was slowing up at her wharf here on Thursday evening the passengers and crew saw the body of a woman floating on the river. H. V. Dalling and Kenneth C. Connell put out in a canoe and tried to overtake the body but could not locate it. Mr. Dalling telephoned Meductic and it was picked up at that point. On Friday morning Coroner Hay, with John Connor, A. Henderson, Ansley Scott, Elijah Oltz, David Oltz, John Scott and A. J. Best as a jury held an inquest. The body proved to be that of Mrs. Cyr, of St. Leonards, who in a fit of melancholy drowned herself and her little daughter four years old. She sought also to drown her son aged seven, but he got away from her. The remains were interred at the Porter burying ground near Meductic. On Friday night a brother of the deceased accompanied by D. O. Bourgoyne, of St. Leonard's, came down, exhumed the remains and took them to St. Leonard's for burial. The woman was about thirty-five years of age. The recent death of her husband had affected her mind.
