

MONEY TO LOAN. CHICKEN FATTENING AND EGG PRODUC-TION.

European Eggs in Canadian Cases.

Professor J. W. Robertson, the Dominion Commissioner of Agriculture and Dairying, has just held a conference in Montreal with the poultry and egg branch of the Montreal Produce Merchants' Association. The president and members represented that, owing to the attention which had been directed lately to the profits from the fattening of chickens, they feared that farmers were fattening and killing a large number of pullets. If that practice were allowed to any greater extent the merchants feared there would be a great reduction in the production of eggs, consequently they advised that farmers be encouraged to put in the crates for fattening only cockerels, and that they should rear as many as practicable of good pullets for the supply of eggs during the winter as well as for the supply of eggs during the summer. The export of eggs from Canada which in 1896 only amounted to the value of \$807,-086, two years later had grown to \$1,255,304 and in 1901 had increased to \$1,691,640.

The egg merchants further recommended that the farmers be advised to kill off the cocks after the first of June. This is desirable in order that eggs collected during June and later may be infertilo, and therefore possess better keeping qualities during the hot weather.

It is reported that large quantities of eggs are now imported into the United Kingdom from continental countries, notably Russia and Austria. These eggs are received in large cases packed in straw. Owing to the excellent reputation won by Canadian eggs, English dealers in many instances are repacking these continental eggs into cases similar to the Canadian staudard egg case, holding thirty dozens each. Although the eggs are not labelled or sold as Canadian eggs, they are sold as eggs in Canadian cases, and to that extent they have an unfair ad. vantage. While this practice is a compliment to the quality and reputation of Canadian eggs, it is, also, a direct injury, since some retailers may take it that these continental eggs in Canadian cases, although not labelled "Canadian," are Canadian eggs, or that Canadian eggs are similar to them in size, quality and condition.







The Jews of Rumania are deprived of the ordinary civil rights by just such a fiction as the "grandfather clause," which disfranchises so many of our Southern negroes. The Jews are held to be "aliens," and thus the treaty provision which requires civic equality of all religions contessions is invaded. It is as logical to declare a man an alien as it is to disfranchise him because his forbears could not have voted before 1863. Grievous as are the disabilities under which the Jews suffer in Rumania, there has been no such record of real persecution as could be cast up against ourselves in the matter of negro lynchings.-New York Post.

How to Prevent Mould.

Reports have been received that a few lots of Canadian butter have been delivered in the United Kingdom somewhat spotted with mould on the butter paper and between the box and the butter. That has occurred on saltless butter. As mould is a tiny plant or fungus, it is important that butter makers and butter dealers should know by what means they can entirely prevent its growth on butter packages, butter paper, or on the butter itself. 

Each creamery should have a cold storage room at a temperature under 38 degrees Fahr ; only retrigerator cars should be used for the carriage of butter; and it should be put in cold storage compartments on the steamships, and be carried at a tem-perature under 25 degrees. A temperature of 20 degrees Fahr. is still better.
