Notwithstanding the reputation the Province of Nova Scotia has as a fruit growing section the Sharp Orchards have orders from that province for several car loads of Crispin Beauties, and the demand is already so great that it is doubtful if these orders can be filled. Last week the Meductic Manufacturing Company had their teams busy hauling barrels up to the orchards.

CHARLES MERRITT and James Miller who were arrested last week on a charge of having broken into the station at Florenceville and stolen two cases of whiskey, were brought before the police magistrate who discharged them. There was no evidence to convict them with the offense. On Saturday Sheriff Foster arrested Bart Danford and Will Hopkins on the same charge and brought them down to town. They pleaded guilty and the police magistrate sentenced them to two years in the penitentiary. This makes the fifth time in three years that the Florenceville station has been broken into and on two of these occasions the safe was blown open.
