Manufacturers will be requested to insist that all their employees be vaccinated. The town council will be requested to insist that all their officials and employees be vaccinated, and to dismiss any who refuse to be vaccinated.

All children attending the public schools who cannot produce certificates of successful vaccination will be refused admission until they have again been vaccinated.
