ABOUT twenty members of the festival chorus drove over to Houlton Thursday last to have a rehearsal with the chorus in that town previous to going to the Littleton festival which takes place on June 26th. Prof. Chapman was present and conducted the singing.

ANDREW D. MCCAIN passed through Woodstock on Friday on his way to England. He sailed from St. John on Saturday by the steamer Florence, which carried 200 tons of compressed hay which Mr. McCain will dispose of. He will look up markets for future consignment while there. He will take in the coronation and visit Scotland and Ireland. Four hundred more tons of hay will go forward on the 17th of this month.
