An Amherst despatch to the Sun says that Lena Adams, the English Servant who stole one hundred dollars from her Armenian mistress, was arrested in Fredericton, was convicted by Judge Morse and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary. When asked if she had anything to say, she made the statement that Habis Korry had induced her to steal the money and that she had given him half of it. Korry, who was then awaiting trial on a charge of assaulting Mrs. Aboud, Lena Adams' employer, was arrested for receiving money, knowing it to be stolen, and was examined by the magistrate yesterday afternoon, Lena Adams being the only principal witness. The case against Korry was adjourned until today.—F'eton Herald, Aug. 16th.
