


Where the Money Went.

When the bubble of the first Panama Canal Company burst, the waste that had been going on was apparent. The company had bought everything by wholesale. When the end came they had on hand one hundred and fifty floating derricks, one hundred and eighty towboats and launches, six thousand iron dumping-wagons, one huudred and ninety miles of rathroad constructed for canal work, and more than ten thousand cars.

There were five thousand buildings along the route, some of them costing thousands of dollars, says Mr. Carpenter in his "South America." Quarters were constructed for thirty thousand workmen. Most of these buildings are now unoccupied, save by negroes, and all are fast going to ruin.

I saw machinery which must have cost millions rotting and rusting away. There were car-wheels enough to equip a trunk line of railway. The officials bought these materials in vast quantities because they made money out of every contract, and the more they bought the more they made; so when a train ran off the track or rolled down an embankment they let it lie, and ordered more

There was one man who had been discharged as worthless by a New York contractor. A few weeks later his old employer met him driving about in state with a black valet.

"I am rich now," he said. "I took a contract to fill a hole along the canal for fifty thousand dollars. Another man had a contract to cut down a hill near my hole for one hundred and fifty thousand dollars. We joined hands, and I charged him fifty thousand dollars to put his hill into my hole. The result was that I made one hundred thousand dollars without spending a cent or doing a stroke of work."

"Oueer Kinds of Business Men."

We have at different times given some curious specimens of business correspondence which have come to our notice, but for elegance of sentiment as well as forcibleness of diction it must be conceded that the letter here following far surpasses them all.

This choicely-worded epistle was received by a leading Montreal house not long ago, in reply to a letter of their's declining an order. It is given verbatim et literatim, though the orthography cannot be reproduced. The real names are suppressed for obvious reasons:

John Smith & Co., I think you must be dam Queer kind of Businesss men that would not sell your stuff when you get a chance g-Dam your sols I do not have to ask those goods for God's sake I am able to Pay the Money for them and we alwas pay our Depts a hundred cents to the dollar. We always Paid you from M—— and I will see that your sails will be very scarce, there are lots of other houses far superior to youse and it don't make any difference to me hoe I Pay my money to when I get the worth of it. I am a jentelmans Sun Tom Murphy Dont give a G-d-for no one.'

"Jentelmans Sun" is good the whole letter proves it. The phrase suggests the sort of gentleman of old time, so-called, who could carry his liquor creditably, go to cock-fights on Sundays, and curse dissenters every day in the week. The son has apparently developed a sort of ungoverned style, both of demeanor and language that some people call independence, but with smacks of lawlessness. Certainly he has a familiar acquaintance with what Don Juan found in Spain to be "the English shibboleth, G-d d-m," and it is quite possibly because of his "don't care" ing so much that the wholesale house refused the order. It seems, by the way, to have struck Tom Murphy with a dull thud that any house should refuse an order and would not sell their stuff when they get a chance" to him or to anybody else. Truly, it is a rarer thing than it ought to be to find orders refused. It would be a good thing, very often, if more wholesale men said NO to applicants. - Monetary Times.

Science Against Gambling.

The republication in English of the famous essay of the great French mathematician, Laplace, on the theory of probabilities serves to recall the harm that has resulted from lack of general information on this subject The confirmed gambler and the reckless speculator do not know how continually they fly in the face of the teachings of science. A recent reviewer remarks: "If in a game of even chances red turns up 20 times in succession, it is still an even chance whether red or black turns up on the 21st time; but no amount of mathematical reasoning will enable the gambler to realize that a previous run of bad luck gives no grounds for the expectation of recovering his losses by a run of good luck in the future." It was partly to combat the superstitions of gamblers and others that Laplace wrote his essay.

An Indian's Spite.

One of the most dastardly and spiteful deeds ever perpetrated by an Indian guide in the province was that committed by Steve Soccobation on Christmas day.

On the morning of Christmas, William Lindsay, in company with Soccobation and Tom Canadian as guides, started out for the Keswick region to hunt moose.

They left the train at Keswick and pitched their tent a short distance from the main line. in the woods. Shortly afterwards they start

ed out for Burtt Lake, and had not gone far when Soccobation began to discharge his rifle quite frequently, by accident, he said, and, blamed it on the rifle. Although reprimanded by Mr. Lindsay, he still continued to fire his rifle, and then Tom Canadian exchanged rifles with Soccobation. This was a valuable rifle, and on Soccobation being asked to return to the camp he became angry and broke the rifle over a rock on his way back. He returned to the camp and packed up all his belongings and apparently started off in anger to walk home. Mr. Lindsay watched the tent for some time, thinking that Soccobation would return, and he sure enough did return, trumping up an excuse each time. When Mr. Lindsay was once out of sight, however, the Indian set fire to the tent, which burned to the ground, destroying all Lindsay's belongings, consisting of two tents, buff-lo robes, provisions, and the whole camping outfit, valued at about \$90. Had Mr. Lindsay been 20 miles in the woods he would certainly have perished from starvation or cold. As it was, he did not get anything to eat until the Woodstock train came down in the evening. When Soccobation had vented his spite by setting fire to the camp he immediately set out for home.

Mr. Lindsay, in company with Tom Canadian, arrived home hungry and much poorer than when he went away. Mr. Lindsay has not decided what steps he will take to punish Soccobation. This crime can be punished with a term in penitentiary if Mr. Lindsay wishes to prosecute. He is taking steps, however, to have Soccobation disqualified as a guide. - Fredericton Gleaner.

Improving Steamship Screws.

A phenomenon known as "cavitation" has lately come to be recognized as one of the most important causes of loss of efficiency in the driving screws of steamships. When the velocity of the screw is increased above a certain limit a cavity is formed in the water inside which the screw revolves, and a further increase of power then causes no increase of the ship's speed. Mathematical investigation, tested by practical experiments, has shown that cavitation can be avoided by preserving a certain ratio between the resistance and the propelling surface concerned. Upon this principle the speed of some vessels has been greatly increased by simply changing their driving screws.

Simplicity and economy are to be the watch-words of the women students at one of the great universities. Expenses for decorations at parties and banquets are to be reduced by the use of tissue-paper hangings instead of smilax and ribbons. The large orchestras are to be cut down to five pieces; invitations and programs to be printed plainly and without ornamentation; refreshments to be limited to simple and inexpensive dishes. 

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
