

IN REPLY.

We had quite thought the controversy between Mr. Carvell and the DISPATCH was closed when suddenly after a couple of weeks that gentleman pops up with another letter. This time he attempts to get a little popular sympathy by whining that the DISPATCH will not print his communications. Everyone knows of course that Mr. Carvell is practically the owner and editor of the Sentinel and has such access to the public ear as that implies. And while we do not reprint his utterances in the DISPATCH, neither does he publish ours in the Sentinel. Mr. Carvell tries to divert attention from the main question by introducing a number of side issues, bolstering them up with untrue statements, and generally attempting to get away from the subject.

The matter to which we called the attention of the liberal party was that Mr. Carvell had packed the convention. This we repeat. It is known by Mr. Carvell and his henchmen, by the men whom he unsuccessfully sought to make parties to the plot, by men to whom he injudiciously made known his scheme long before the convention, and in fact by the whole county. It is not surprising that Mr. Carvell seeks to deny it. It was a job sufficiently contemptible for even Mr. Carvell to remember with shame.

We desire also to repeat that the liberal party refused to support Mr. Carvell's ticket, and that with all the resources of civilization at his command, and some other resources not of civilization, he could elect only one man, and him at the foot of the class; and in Mr. Carvell's own parish, where he was born and grew up, the party got a thrashing such as it never received before.

Mr. Carvell has proved himself a valuable assistance to the conservative party in Carleton County, for when he makes his most violent efforts to defeat them he always swamps his own friends and advances the cause of his opponents. One man has said that if there had been a Carvell in every county the government would not have got half a dozen supporters. Mr. Carvell is a valiant warrior in the cause of liberalism who never won a battle for it and who leaves his mark in the history of the cause only by petty jobbery.

Mr. Carvell has drawn into the controversy one Gideon Phillips who complains that Mr. Appleby refused to pay out some government money on the strength of a letter from him. If these two people, Mr. Carvell and Mr. Phillips, did not adopt so solemn a tone in the matter one would think this was a joke. It will be remembered that a few years ago Mr. Phillips was guilty of a piece of jobbery in connection with the building of a bridge, or rather, the non building of a bridge in Brighton, for which the money was paid and never a stroke of work done on it. Having in mind Mr. Phillips' most unsavory reputation in the matter of the handling of government money Mr. Appleby hardly felt justified in asking the government to pay out money on no other certificate than this mere request of Mr. Gideon Phillips. Mr. Phillips' real grievance against Mr. Appleby is that Mr. Appleby would not appoint him sheriff.

The Two Pocketbooks.

Not long ago an instructor at an Eastern university said to his class, "Always have a good book by you to read when you ought to be doing something else." This, like many other epigrams, is not a rule rigidly to be followed.

The idea finds fuller expression in some recent advice from Senator Hoar: "Be diligent in your business, but not diligent to the exclusion of everything else. Read. Take some good author and soak yourself in him. The man who does but one thing well is only a one armed man or a one-eyed man."

It is not right to read when one ought to be doing something else, but it is right to set aside some part of the waking hours, when the mind is fresh enough to grapple with good ideas, and use it in work of a different kind from that which we do for a livelihood. For those whose chief occupation is intellectual, this secondary work should be labor with the hands. But for most people it might well consist in reading good magazines or books. There are so many cheap pocket editions of standard works that the equipment for such reading is neither expensive nor cumbersome. One's principal occupation is supposed to fill the pocketbook. The other pocket book, a copy of an English classic, is a treasure always full.

This reading, then, is not merely the lighter sort done for relaxation in the hours of rest. It is work of an important kind. Every man owes it to society not only to earn bread, but to be an intelligent citizen, with ideas on life and knowledge of affairs. To fulfil this duty he reads, and to make the reading effective he must approach it as serious though joyous labor.
