### Getting Rich on Potatoes.

An exposition is now "on" in Berlin devoted to showing what can be done with the potato as human food, as food for animals and as material for alcohol, starch, dextrin, etc.

One-eighth of all the arable land in Germany is planted to potatoes. For every 10,000 people we plant 34.5 acres, Great Britain and Ireland 31 acres, France 98 acres, Germany 160 acres.

The quantity potatoes raised per acre is greater in Germany than elsewhere. It has been increased 38 per cent. in recent years by men in spectacles who never touch a hoe, but investigate soil needs.

One-half the potatoes are eaten as human food, so that Germans must eat far more potatoes than do other peoples. Prizes are now offered for the best apparatus for preparing potatoes for animal food.

Dextrin and potato starch are familiar everywhere, but potato-alcohol developments in Germany are thoroughly up to date. The Daimler Motor Company—the same that makes automobiles—built a 50-horse-power engine run by potato alcohol as fuel for the Russian Marine Department; it was greatly admired by Emperor William.

Lighting apparatus for streets, rooms and shops and many forms of alcohol heating stoves are interesting. The advantages are obvious. No smoke, smell, no great exhaustion of the air, comparative cheapness. The best lights are those which pass potato-alcohol vapor through a mantle like the Welsbach.

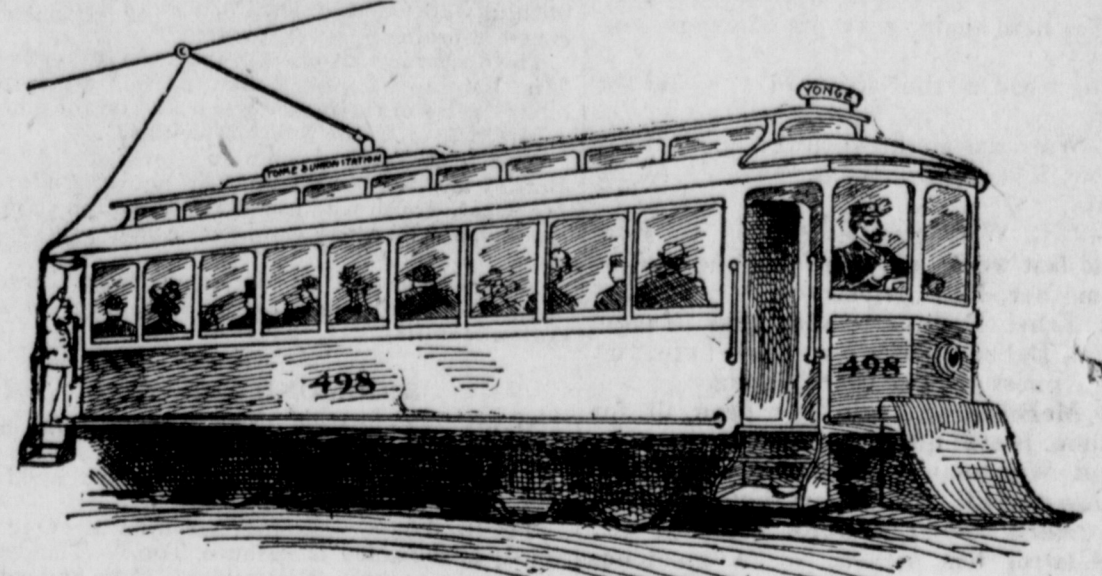
Alcohol for commercial purposes pays neither tariff nor tax in Germany. The Central Association for Alcohol Distribution sells it at any railroad station in Germany for from 15 to 17 cents a gallon—a cheaper fuel than oil is in this country under the beneficent tariff that protects the Standard Oil Company's "infant industry."

Motor carriages, even yachts and small naval vessels can be driven by potato alcohol engines.

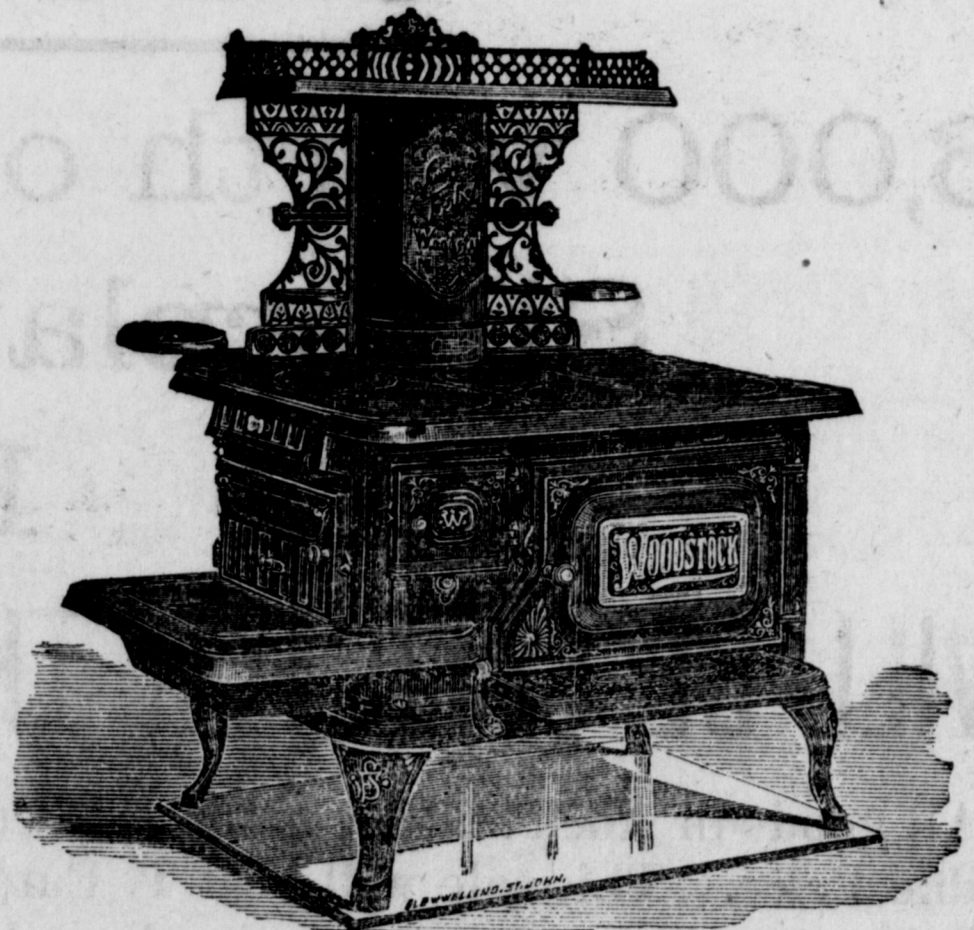
