Advertising Suggestions From the Cana-  
dian Grocer.

What a tremendous amount of money is  
spent in advertising. Is that money wasted?  
If so, it is the fault of the advertiser. There  
are merchants who have spent enormous  
sums on advertising, and, because the results  
were not so good as they should have been,  
have made the sweeping assertion that ad-  
vertising does not pay. What is the reason that  
advertising pays some merchants and not  
others? The reason is that some merchants  
know how to advertise and some do not. A  
style of advertising that suits the city will  
not do for rural districts; advertising that  
brings good returns to one store may not  
to another. Advertisements to reach a certain  
class of people must be placed in a certain  
medium, and to reach other classes must be  
placed in other media; nor will a system of  
advertising used by a well-known firm do for  
one just starting. Some firms haven't time  
to see that the money they set aside annually  
for advertising is judiciously invested, and  
thus neglect the most important department  
of their business. Is it any wonder that  
such firms have reason to say that advertis-  
ing does not pay? Advertising, if done well,  
does pay.

One should always be honest in one's ad-  
vertising. You may "fool all of the people  
some of the time and some of the people all  
the time, but you cannot fool all of the peo-  
ple all the time."

Some time or other the little deceits in  
your advertising are going to come out and  
count against you. Each time these little  
deceits are exposed part of your good reputa-  
tion goes, until finally it is entirely lost.

"You may mend a broken reputation, but  
your neighbors will keep their eyes on the  
crack." It is also much harder to "mend"  
your reputation than it was to build it up in  
the first place.

Honesty is certainly the best policy in ad-  
vertising, although at the time better results  
may be had from "ads." which are not strict-  
ly honest.

Never say anything in your advertising  
that you cannot verify in your store. An  
advertiser who believes thoroughly in what  
he is going to say has a far better chance of  
convincing people than he who only half be-  
lieves what he is saying.  
"Truth is mighty," especially when it  
looms up in an attractive advertisement.—  
The Canadian Grocer.

A New Bismarck Letter.

Perhaps the most remarkable of the newly-  
discovered Bismarck letters addressed to his  
wife during the Franco-Prussian war is pub-  
lished by the illustrated Berlin weekly,  
'Gartenlaube.' It is dated 'Pont a Mousson,  
Aug. 17,' after the disastrous German cavalry  
attack at Vionville. During the fight Bis-  
marck's elder son, William, had his horse  
shot under him. Bismarck tells his wife how  
he found both: 'Immediately we heard the  
1st Drogoons had lost many men I enquired  
the way to the hospital of their wounded. I  
found two hundred and fifty in a lonely farm-  
house, and among them Herbert, and Bill  
visiting him under the preference of requisit-  
ing a new horse. Herbert had two holes  
in the thigh, one marking the bullet's en-  
trance and the other the exit.

'One other bullet had penetrated my old  
black watch which he wore. I took it, but  
left him the ten-franc watch recently bought.  
You shall have the black one as a souvenir.

'Herbert will see no more of war. I shall  
send him home by railway. Wouldn't you  
like to nurse him at Nauheim? If he does  
not get the iron cross I shall never again  
wear decorations.

'Bill is not hurt. When his horse was  
shot he fell over head foremost, which  
accounts for the rumor of his death. He's as  
fat and merry as ever, and looked very  
dirty.'

Bismarck then names many other wounded  
known to his wife, and says: 'All these are  
victims of the foolish, impossible attack  
ordered by Gen. Voigts Rheetz, costing one-  
third of the men and one-half of the officers.  
The command of our First and Second Army  
Corps has plenty of fist, but no head.'—Lon-  
don 'Daily Mail.'

effort.

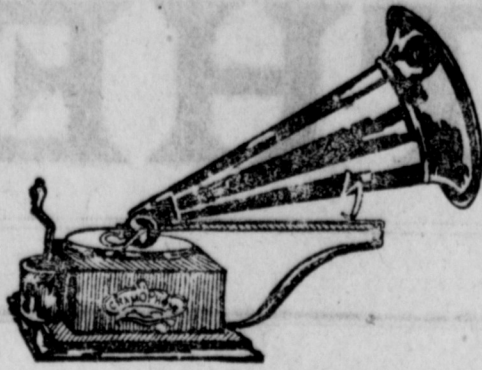
Listen well, answer cautiously, decide

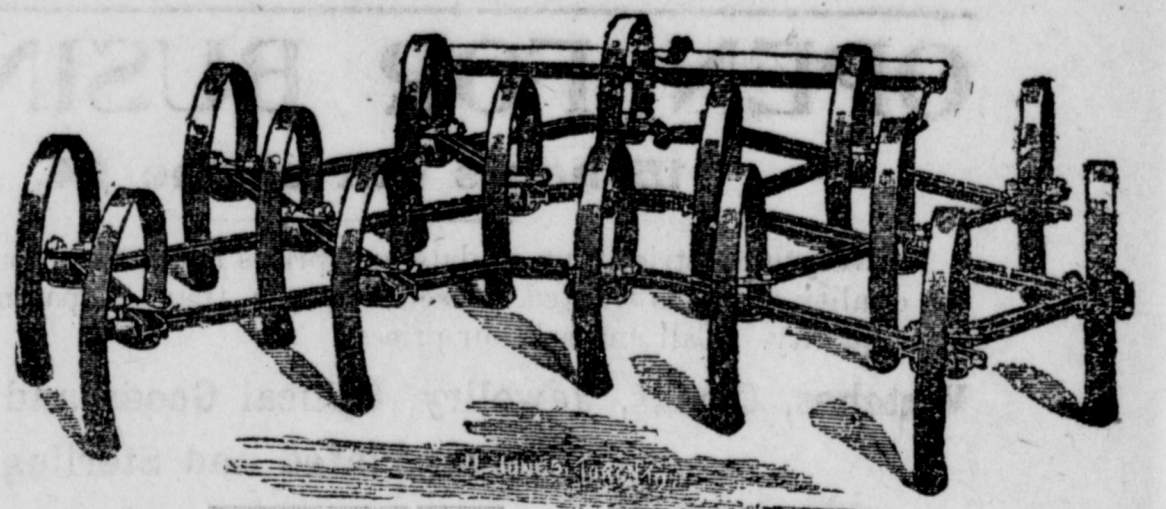
