A GREAT deal of attention is directed to a silver cup in the window of Carr & Gibson where there is on exhibition the cup presented by the business men of town to the Carleton County Agricultural Society. The cup is twenty-four inches high, and very gracefully formed. It is surmounted by a plow and a horses head protrudes from each side of the neck of the cup. At its largest part it is decorated in bas relief with a bit, reins and horse shoe, and at the base are a hoe and rake. It rests on an ebonized pedestal. The inscription is "Presented by the business men of Woodstock, 1902, to the Carleton County Agricultural Society, for competition in hauling contest." The cup was procured by the society through Carr & Gibson. Mr. Trafford won it this year for the Centreville society.
