Why Farm Labor is Scarce.

At two gatherings of farmers held in Toronto the lack of hired help was discussed, and steps recommended to bring in more laborers. The matter is one not to be solved by the coming over from Britain of a few thousand immigrants. The great difficulty lies in our farmers needing help during a part of the year only. Nearly every farmer wants extra help from April to the end of October; after the fall plowing is done the hired man may go. It is one of the many drawbacks of our climate that work in the field is only practicable for six months in the year, so that farm-laborers cannot, as a rule, count on steady employment the year round. This, in itself must necessarily always make such labor scarce. We have repeatedly watched the arrival among us of likely young fellows in the spring who were eagerly sought after, yet turned adrift in the fall. Naturally they went to the cities to seek something to do that would give them employment the year round, and these men were not available when the spring came again. In addition to this drawback, which cannot be overcome, is the treatment of the help by some farmers, which has made hiring in the country unpopular. Long hours, working on Sundays, poor board, irregular payment of wages, and unkindly treatment have done their part to bring about a condition that is injuring the farmer. The suggestion made by the city papers that higher wages must be offered to get help is an impossible one. The earnings of the farmer are too small to enable him to pay the \$5 or \$6 a week which they talk of. Where a farmer has little help in his family and has to depend on hiring, he may as well sell out. It is one of the consequences of a protective tariff, that wages in every line of employment become higher than the earnings of the farm can bear to pay.—Huntington Gleaner.

A Convincing Prophet.

In discussing the attempted pilgrimage of the Canadian Doukhobors, who set out through the snow "to find Jesus," the London "Spectator" says that this is only another instance of the length to which the credulous Eastern mind can be carried. It gives a parallel case of wild belief among the Muruts, a race of squalid savages living in Borneo.

One day, a year or two ago, there appeared among them a Murut, naked like themselves, and apparently differing in no way from his fellows. Yet in a short time he was able to make the members of the tribe surrender to him their wives, their cattle and other possessions simply on the strength of his own declaration as to his powers.

He asserted that he could confer on devout disciples the power of flying. No one asked him to fly himself; it seemed never to occur to them. Yet a number of men climbed to the tops of the highest coconut-trees in the village, and leaped into the air.

When they were found to be dead, it is only reasonable to suppose that the survivors set upon the false prophet and killed him. Nothing of the sort! On the contrary, he explained that the dead men had not been sufficiently devout, and he found no difficulty in inducing others to follow the example.

At last, after he had initiated over twenty men into the process of flying from the tops of the trees to the ground, he was arrested through foreign agency and thrown into prison. But even then the natives believed in him to such an extent that they resented any interference in the matter.

Minnesota's Women Wage-Earners.

It is evident that the Minnesota male is in a perilous position. In 1890 only one woman was employed to every twelve men, but in 1900 one woman was employed to every seven men. At this rate in about twenty years there will be as many women employed as men. But why should any man mind? For if there is plenty of work for both men and women, as there is in these times, no one need care whether one woman is employed to twelve men or one man to twelve women, and if there is not enough work to go around among both sexes, what would be pleasanter than to stay at home and putter about the house and yard humming the old song, "Every Day'll Be Sunday Bye-n-bye," while wife and daughter are toiling at the office? At the same time, if anyone doesn't find comfort in that prospect, there is really nothing to be alarmed about.

The fact is that the demand for help in these days of prosperity has been greater than the supply of men, and the women have been called in to lend a hand. But they have their limitations, and as it is the rule that the least efficient workers are the first to be discharged when business demands a reduction in the working force, the first setback will probably put many of the women wage-earners back washing dishes and making beds. At any rate, there are so many of them who don't want to work, including some who don't work, even at home, on anything but a new dress or a stock, that the top limit of the employment of women will probably soon be reached.—[St Paul Pioneer Press.

Taxation and Militarism in Italy.

The people of Italy are ground down by taxation. At the gate of every city there is a custom house to take toll of the poor man's morsel of coarse bread and cup of thin wine. The tax-gatherer goes round counting every leaf of tobacco that is grown. Salt is taxed, and the tax is so rigorously enforced that salt cannot even be taken from the sea. To wring out still more revenue, the people are at once pillaged and deprived by government lotteries. The government, nevertheless, proposes a large increase of the fleet. All other nations, it says, have doubled their naval expenditure, and Italy must not be left behind. One party in the Assembly actually shouts for war "to avenge Lissa," a naval engagement with the Austrians in which Italy had rather the worst of it, and which took place a full generation ago. Thus all Governments are emulously wasting the bread of the people in the means of destruction. What is to put a limit to this? The people themselves, unfortunately, cannot be trusted to do it, even where they have the suffrage. They are easily carried away by the passion of war, on which unscrupulous politicians know only too well how to play.
