

Death of Stephen VanWart.

Stephen VanWart died at his residence, Main street, on Saturday morning at ten o'clock, of consumption, at the age of 49 years. He had been ill and unable to work for three years, and for a year before his death had been confined to his bed. He leaves a widow, one son, Guy C., of the pay office of the British Army at Valetta, Malta, and three brothers, Isaac, of Woodstock, George, of Grafton, and Henry, of Montana.

For more than a year his only son had been endeavouring to get leave of absence to come home to see his father before he passed away and at length the leave came and the son sailed from Malta, just the day before his father's death.

The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon, the services being conducted by the Rev. F. A. Currier assisted by the Rev. B. Colpitts. The pall bearers were Albert J. Hayden, Isaac Hamm, Theodore McKinney and Fred H. Webber.

Carleton County Agricultural Society.

The annual meeting of the Carleton County Agricultural Society was held in the Record office on Tuesday afternoon November 10th, and on the evening of that day the second annual banquet of the society was held at the Carlisle Hotel.

A report on the late exhibition was submitted showing an indebtedness of the society amounting to about \$1300. Part of this was for new buildings erected and it is expected that the local government will make an advance of about \$800.00 of this amount. In addition there is some money due the society for seeds, and this will reduce the debt somewhat further.

The auditor, H. D. Stevens reported the books of the Secretary, J. Rankin Brown to be correct in every detail.

An additional grant of \$15.00 was voted to Mr. Brown for his valuable service in connection with the exhibition.

At the banquet in the evening there were about seventy-five guests present. The guests of honour were to have been John A. Shea, Hamilton Emery, Hugh Hay and John S. Leighton, but only two of them, Mr. Emery and Mr. Hay, were able to be present.

MR. C. L. SMITH, SECRETARY CARLETON CO. AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY, WOODSTOCK, N. B.

MY DEAR SIR:—I want to thank you for your kind invitation and if I were feeling well and could arrange so as to be away but one night, should be strongly tempted to accept, for some-how there is growing a strong bond of interest and sympathy between myself and the loyal workers in your Agriculture.

I would like very much to stand before your society and to the best of my ability urge the absolute necessity for strengthening certain lines of works and the relation this will bear to the growth of Carleton County. It sometimes seems to me that it is altogether too easy to fall into the habit of thinking that other people live under better conditions than we, and, while there are differences, yet if your farmers would only wake up to the possibilities of aggressive dairy work, along with the other lines now being carried on, you would see a great change in the situation within ten years.

The weak point in your Exhibition in September, was in dairy lines, just where you ought to have been strongest. Instead of a score or more of Jerseys, good ones they were, you ought to have had at least one hundred on your Fair grounds that week.

You have demonstrated the fact of the superiority of your butter product. You have practically won out in the fight with Denmark in your English markets and if your farmers want the dollars, the dairy cow, of large production, bred in dairy lines, is the animal to give you results.

Strengthen your dairy work for the good of your County and to this, multiply the well bred, carefully selected, high grade or pure bred Jerseys and Guernseys. There is room for all the breeds and surely for all purpose shorthorn, but just so sure as you let go of your special dairy cow, your dairy industry will suffer. It cannot be maintained upon a general average, and this fact I would like to talk with you about. May I ask that you extend my best wishes to each and every member of your society and with it a cordial greeting of good will.

Eastern agriculture is sure to increase in the near future and good farmers will feel a new thrill of life if the work of the next few years is pushed with energy, enthusiasm and unbounded faith. Trusting I may have the privilege of meeting you ere long, I am,

The enthusiasm which Murdoch's playing called forth has probably never been exceeded in the opera house."

Samuel R. Boyer.

Samuel R. Boyer, one of the best known men in Carleton County died suddenly at his home at Victoria Corner on Friday morning. He was the eldest son of the late James Boyer.

For some years Mr. Boyer conducted a general store at East Florenceville where he built up one of the most prosperous businesses in the county. About two years ago he sold out to B. Frank Smith, M. P. P., and moved to Victoria Corner where he has since resided.

He leaves a wife and one daughter, a mother and one brother.

The funeral was held on Sunday from the Free Baptist church.

Cruelty To Children.

Mr. and Mrs. Lena Robinson of St. John St. were before the police court on Saturday on a charge of excessive punishment of a child seven years old. The charge was preferred by Mr. Colpitts, agent of the society for the prevention of cruelty to children. A. B. Connell K. C. appeared for the prosecution and T. C. L. Ketchum for the defence.

After hearing the evidence the police magistrate said that he was fully convinced that Mrs. Robinson had been in the habit of punishing the child excessively, but he would not impose a fine as he thought the prosecution would have the desired effect of deterring her from committing further offense.
