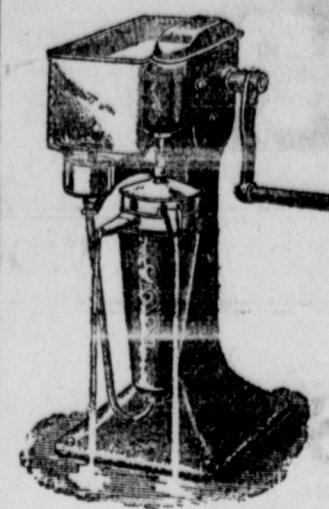

**Hint for the Table.**

An old fashioned soft gingerbread.—The proportion for this gingerbread will make about two very large cakes, which may be baked in big dripping pans. To make it take one pound of butter, one quart of sour cream or milk and one pound of powdered sugar and enough ginger to flavor well. Add ten eggs; mix to a cream the butter, ginger and sugar; then add three or four eggs and beat all well together. Continue adding the eggs two at a time till all are beaten in; then add one quart of molasses, a little at a time, whipping all well, till a smooth mixture, then add milk or cream and three teaspoonful of baking soda dissolved in a very little hot water, and, last of all, stir in gradually three teaspoonfuls of baking soda dissolved in a very little hot water, and, last of all, stir in gradually three pounds of sifted flour. Bake in a moderate oven.
